

START 'EM YOUNG

For those looking to get little ones into the sport, there are a plethora of programs suited for the tiniest skiers and riders. Here are some highlights to consider.

Monarch Mountain

Mini + Me lessons let parent/child pairs grow together, though mom or dad must already know how to ski or snowboard. During the two-hour session, kids ages 3 to 6 will be shown the ropes, while the adults receive coaching tips.

Keystone Resort

More than a ski school, Camp Keystone relies on a special kids-only zone with fun, interactive displays, game-aided learning and a designated teaching area — all meant to boost confidence and foster a love of skiing or riding from the very start.

Beaver Creek Resort

Making good on a promise that kids will learn to ski through its instruction, Beaver Creek Ski School provides a fourth lesson day for free if someone hasn't met the target goal according to of lessons.

Purgatory Resort

Strider Snowbike Lessons give 3- to 4-year-olds a chance to develop balance and motor skills before trying out real-deal skis or boards. Once comfortable, youngsters ages 3 to 6 can hone snowboarding skills at **Burton** Riglet Park, a playground-like setting with its own happy hour: one hour of instruction for \$15.

Steamboat Ski Resort

An alternative to the regular kids' clinic, the full-day Steamboat Signature Five Program (first grade through age 17) limits groups to five students per instructor based on skill level, so there's more emphasis on personal



Ski Cooper

Adorably named, the two-hour Panda Cubs (4-year-old skiers) and Panda Sliders (5- to 7-yearold snowboarders) programs are for the wee crowd, while full-day Panda Patrol (skiers ages 5-13 and snowboarders ages 8-13) works with the older kids, and gives you a chance to take advantage of a 10 percent discount on your own lesson.

Winter Park Resort

Time off from school is a perfect opportunity to pick up new skills outside of the classroom. With two-day programs over long weekends for Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Presidents Day, plus two different three-day sessions during spring break, you've got your holiday plans already made.

Less familiar but known for fewer crowds, free parking and shorter lift lines, the GEMS are hidden treasures with great value. Get a deal card, which grants two 2-for-1 lift tickets or two 30-percentoff lift tickets at each resort. In addition to those noted by the GEMS icon, other locations include:

Powderhorn Mountain Resort, Mesa: Saturday and Sunday free Learn-to-Ski & Ride Program

Sunlight Mountain Resort, Glenwood Springs: 75 percent of the terrain is suited for newcomers

Hesperus Ski Area, **Durango**: Extend the day with night skiing or hit the tubing hill

Kendall Mountain, Silverton: A manageable 240 feet of vertical drop puts families at ease

Learning something new isn't just for youngsters. Later-in-life beginners also have an array of options at their disposal.

Алараhое Basin Ski Алеа

With a **FLEX 4** lesson pack, you can decide to use all four lesson vouchers yourself or share them with anyone age 3 and up. Half and full days are both available, and a lift ticket is included. If you have more time to devote, the **Molly to Mountain** program allows as many half-day lessons as you need at the Pika Place and Molly Hogan learning areas, in addition to equipment rental and a lift ticket.



Geared to set first-timers up for success, the **Full Day Beginner Adventure** is offered to skiers and riders and includes your lift ticket.
Burgeoning boarders should also look into the **Burton Learn to Ride**program, a terrain-based approach that helps reduce anxiety about
losing control of your board.

Breckenridge Ski Resort

BRECKENRIDGE

Check the schedule for **Women & Wine**, a half-day, ladies-only ski lesson where participants are grouped by ability level (so don't worry about not being able to keep up). A reward for your efforts comes in the form of a glass of wine après.

Cho Mountain

IDAHO SPRINGS

Free instruction, you say? With the purchase of a day pass you'll have complimentary access to **Echo**

Mountain Ambassadors, a team of ski and snowboard coaches that are

stationed around the beginner area and near the lodge. Hit them up for pointers, tips and suggestions at the closest ski area to Denver.

Coveland Ski Area

NEAR GEORGETOWN

With the **Newcomer 3-Class Pass**, you start with a full day and then two additional half-day **Master the**

Mountain lessons. After completion, you'll receive a free season pass to further work on your technique. Separate from the main Loveland Basin, **Loveland Valley** is an area with gentle slopes, and a **Lift 7-only** ticket lets you utilize just that lift's terrain, as well as the magic-carpet surface lift, at a great price.

Aspen Snowmass

ASPEN & SNOWMASS VILLAGE

Two of the four mountains of this massive ski area — **Buttermilk** and **Snowmass** — feature **Adult First Time**

one- or three-day ski or snowboard classes with an accelerated learning method and specialized equipment to jump-start your snowy love affair with the sport.

Vail Ski Resort

VAIL

Work with a pro for three consecutive days through the **Adult First Time Series** (ski or snowboard). The

third day is granted at a reduced rate, and the goal is that by the end of the course you'll be confidently tackling the green trails.

<u>Tips for Beginners</u>

Looking up at a steep peak as you watch someone carve down a black-diamond run, it's easy to feel intimidated. But even expert powder hounds had to start somewhere. Aside from taking a lesson, here is some of the most important advice to heed.

- Know the learningcurve difference between skiing and snowboarding; many say that skiing is easier initially, but snowboarding has a faster rate of advancement
- Make sure your boots aren't too big — the rental shop can help you get the perfect fit
- Stick to learning areas and beginner terrain until you're comfortable
 there's no shame in a magic-carpet ride!
- Learn to layer appropriately (a thermal base layer is super important) but don't double up on socks; just wear a good, moisture-wicking material like Merino wool (ayoid cotton)
- Wear sunscreen yes, even on snowy days and a helmet
- Learn to maintain control and master stopping first
- Yield to people in front of you
- Don't stop where people can't see you from behind (example: below the crest of a hill)

January is Learn to Ski & Snowboard Month, so look for other special lesson bargains at that time. Throughout the season, Howelsen Hill Ski Area in Steamboat Springs hosts Ski Free Sundays — just pick up your free ticket at the lodge. There's also something to be said for beginner-friendly layouts. Two to seek out are Copper Mountain's Green Acres learning area near Frisco, and Granby Ranch, whose family-oriented mountain in Granby is laid out so all trails start at the same point and end at the base. In the off-season, book a lesson at the SNÖBAHN Indoor Ski and Snowboard Center in Centennial for more practice.
