Back to the Future: Back in Time

If nostalgia brought you back to board games, then this one may be just right for you! Based on the 1985 movie, Back To The Future, a cooperative board game features characters Lorraine, George and Biff moving through the town, via the turn tracker board, movement cards and dice rolls. To win the game, you must complete two challenges in the final round. This is a terrific family game designed for 2 to 4 players, ages 10 and up. It is a thoughtfully designed tabletop game with amazing graphics. However, this game can turn into a long one, so make sure you have plenty of time when you sit down to play.

Patchwork

A fun board game and one of the best board games to start out with, Patchwork is a strategy game that really does give you a feel for quilting as you piece together uneven fabric swatch tiles on your individual game board. The challenge is heightened by coordinating colours, patterns and button placement. To win the game, you need to have the highest score for the most aesthetically pleasing quilt. This is a two-player game for ages 8 and up. The cool thing is that you actually feel pretty crafty playing the game, and it has a nice cosy feel to it. One round is pretty fast-paced, only taking about a half-hour to play through.

Harry Potter: Death Eaters Rising

For the Harry Potter fandom, there is Harry Potter: Death Eaters Rising. This is a cooperative dice and card game where players must battle the Dark Lord by summoning magical help from Dumbledore's Army, the Order of the Phoenix, and Hogwarts. To win the game, cooperatively defeat Lord Voldemort with enough wizards and uncorrupted locations. This game is great for 2 to 4 players, ages 11 and up. This is a very well done theme that will not disappoint fans. However, it can be a little harder to learn, especially if you aren't a fan of the books or movies. Once you know how to play, it takes about an hour.

Gloomhaven

Gloomhaven is a legacy format fantasy-based game where players work their way through dozens of combat scenarios to complete a story using a deck of cards. While it has been called the best tabletop game for solo play, Gloomhaven can be played as a cooperative board game by up to four players. One of the best board games for adults, it is recommended for ages 14 and up. Popular among players who like more of a Dungeons & Dragons type of game, it typically takes around 90 to 115 minutes, per scenario, to play.

Exploding Kittens

If you are looking for an entertaining party game, look no further than Exploding Kittens. It might sound bad, but as card games go, it's one of the funniest ever, with ridiculous characters and actions that help you to avoid drawing the dreaded exploding kitten card. To win the game, you have to avoid the exploding kitten and be the last player standing. The game is fast-paced and fun for ages 7 and up, and can be played by up to 10 players. The rules are straightforward and only take a few minutes to learn, and one round of the game usually lasts 10 to 20 minutes.

Catan

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No list of the best board games could be complete without mentioning Settlers Of Catan. Catan is a classic game when it comes to tabletop games that is beloved by millions around the globe. If you have never played it, centres around players building settlements using resource cards. Players build settlements into cities to achieve victory points. To win the game, a player must first reach the established number of victory points. Originally, it was designed for 3 to 4 players, but with the expansion can be played by as many as 12, and is suitable for ages 12 and up. The game usually takes 1 to 2 hours to play through.
