Signs of Dental Issues in Your Pet

- Bad breath (halitosis)
- Drooling
- Change in chewing habits
- Discolored teeth
- Reduced appetite
- Swelling around the mouth
- Tooth loss
- Bleeding gums

Making Dental Care a Priority

There are different ways you can work to give your pet the best oral care, and it depends on what works for you and them. Here are some ways you can make sure your pet's teeth stay clean and healthy.

Brushing their teeth

The single most effective way to keep up your pet's oral hygiene is to brush their teeth. Pet-specific toothpaste was designed with them in mind, made safe enough to swallow, and available in flavors like beef or poultry.

If possible, introduce brushing during your pet's training, so it becomes a natural part of their routine. Regardless, when beginning to brush their teeth, you should take small steps to get them used to it. For example, letting them taste the toothpaste first allows them to get used to the flavor, and holding the pet toothbrush against their teeth lets them get accustomed to the texture and feel.

Incorporate other dental products

There are many options for food for both dogs and cats designed to help fight tartar and plaque. Treats, additives, and sprays or gels are also available for both species, as well as rawhide chews for dogs.

Since it's hard to know which products are effective and which aren't, it's important to check in with your pet's veterinarian to make sure any new products you introduce are good for them.

Professional dental cleanings

If brushing your pet's teeth yourself isn't possible, there's always the option of having their teeth cleaned professionally at your veterinarian's office. Usually, pets will need to be put under anesthesia for this process to allow for a thorough cleaning.
