1. What inspired you to become a teacher?

I was inspired to become a teacher after having a really bad experience with a teacher in graduate school. On the first day of class, this teacher walked in and said "I don't want to be here any more than you do. So, let's get through this." In my mind I was thinking about how much I actually wanted to be in that class. Not the students in Ms. Mankowski's 12th grade Economics class. These seniors recently learned about resource management by playing the game Settlers of Catan. Ms. Mankowski is committed to teaching skills that have real-world applications and she incorporates project-based, hands-on and experiential learning experiences in all her classes.

In addition to Economics, Ms. Mankowski currently teaches Life Skills for students in 6th-8th grade and Career and Technical Education for 9th-12th graders.

Life skills students are getting a real-world education in budgeting. All students applied for, and have been assigned classroom jobs, which earn them weekly "paychecks." Students learn to budget their money between shopping in the classroom store and paying for essentials, such as "renting" their table spot.

Students in Career and Technical Education classes have completed career interest inventories, vision boards, and are learning about the requirements for their preferred careers.

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October is Bullying Prevention Month



57% of bullying situations stop when a peer intervenes on behalf of the student being bullied.

October is National Bullying Prevention Month. Incidents of bullying are rare within New Heights' small, relational environment, but when they do occur, they are investigated and addressed quickly.

While many tend to label any act of bad behavior as bullying, the truth is, to be classified as bullying, behaviors must be comprised of three core components—unwanted aggressive behavior, occurring repeatedly, involving a real or perceived power imbalance.

According to the U.S. Department of Education, one in five students report being bullied at school and slightly more girls (23%) than boys (19%) report experiencing bullying. While bullying occurs at all ages, studies find bullying peaks in 6th grade.

Teachers work hard to create classroom spaces that are respectful and free from bullying, however bullying is not most effectively stopped by teachers—it is stopped by students.

The National Bullying Prevention Center

reports that in more than half of bullying situations (57%)

bullying behaviors

stop when a peer intervenes on behalf of the student being bullied.

If you need to keep your receipt for record keeping but can provide it later, just turn it in to the New Heights main office and collected receipts will be brought to Kowalski's.

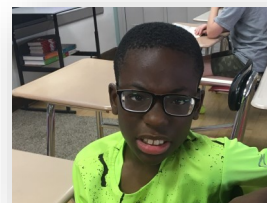

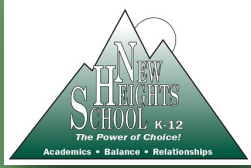


PARKING ON MULBERRY STREET
