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## News : US jet fuel demand hits pandemic highs in week-ended July 23: EIA

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Rising for the third straight week, **US jet fuel** supplied – an implied measure of demand – rose to a 16-month high during the week ended July 23, **US** Energy Information Administration data showed July 28.


Total **jet fuel** demand rose 247,000 b/d on the week to 1.65 million b/d. Demand was last seen higher during the week-ended Mar. 13, 2020 at 1.75 million b/d before falling to 352,000 b/d in May of that year at the height of the coronavirus pandemic


Nationwide jet fuel stocks climbed for the third consecutive week, rising to 45.1 million barrels, up 79,000 barrels the week prior. Gulf Coast and West Coast production led with the strongest regional builds.

**Gulf Coast jet** inventories rose 338,000 barrels to 16.4 million barrels, the highest in a year. West Coast stocks rose 149,000 barrels on the week to 8.9 million barrels.


**US** fuel production dipped 1,000 b/d on the week to 1.4 million b/d. Still, production on the Gulf rose 46,000 b/d on the week to 785,000 b/d, its highest in 16-months.

Production drops in the Midwest and West Coast, however, offset the **Gulf Coast** production spike. Midwest **jet fuel** production fell 38,000 b/d on the week to 236,000 b/d, **EIA** data showed. On the West Coast, production hit a 7 week low, dropping 11,000 b/d to 325,000 barrels.





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
