DETERMINED William Reckless shows he has made huge strides since losing both legs to sepsis.

The four-year-old was diagnosed in January and in intensive care three months, having his lower legs and parts of his fingers amputated.

He got his prosthetic limbs in May and started building up his strength – and learning how to walk all over again.

Mum Gemma, 30, said: "When your baby takes their first steps it's magical but when they have to learn a second time, after months of watching their pain, fear, frustration, hard work and determination, the pride we feel is something else."

Gemma said: "He's got on with it, he's not moaned and has accepted everything thrown at him.

"He's still William. He's adapted amazingly well, he's still upbeat with a good attitude."

Gemma and Michael, 38, of Nottingham, and who also have daughter Georgia, two, want to boost sepsis awareness.

She said: "The quicker you spot it the less damage."

## Matt: Acting started as a hobby for me

The Oscar-winner, 50, shot to fame in 1993 comedy Dazed And Confused – but his dad died just five days into filming.

He said on US TV: "He was alive when I started something I thought might be a hobby but turned into a career. So, there's a great serendipity in that for me."

After romantic comedies he moved on to more dramatic roles, leading to a best actor Academy Award for his portrayal of a cowboy diagnosed with AIDS in 2013 biopic Dallas Buyers Club.

The dad of three has now written a memoir which he described as an "aspirational book".

### Gandhi's specs being eyed up at over £10k

A PAIR of Mahatma Gandhi's glasses are expected to sell for more than £10,000. Auctioneers said they found them "poking precariously" out of their letter box in a small envelope. A note included a phone number for the owner and said the specs had been Gandhi's. Andrew Stowe, of East Bristol Auctions, said: "It was the most bizarre five minutes of my career. "Once we dug a little deeper, we realised these

glasses were a find of huge historical importance." He added the owner was "rather surprised" at the large valuation. Gandhi, who led the campaign for Indian independence from British rule through non-violent resistance, was assassinated in 1948, aged 78.

It is thought he gave the glasses to the owner's uncle in South Africa in the 1920s. The auction is on August 21.
