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Wiggo: I won't top home gold

BRADLEY WIGGINS last night admitted winning gold in his home city was the pinnacle of his glittering career. The 32-year-old cyclist became the first

man to win the Tour de France and Olympic gold in the same year after an imperious performance in the 44-kilometre time-trial at Hampton Court.

The success saw Wiggins claim a fourth Olympic gold and a seventh medal in all, surpassing Sir Steve Redgrave's British-record haul, and adding Britain's second gold of the Games after rowers Helen Glover and Heather Stanby **RICHARD HOOKHAM** Deputy Olympics Editor


ning won the women's pair to become Britain's first female Olympic rowing champions yesterday.
