Share responsibilities Andrew and I split the parenting equally, working part-time on our illustration and pottery around each other's deadlines. It's a juggle but it means Wren (five) and Fred (three) get to be with both of us – they love being involved in activities like cooking and gardening. And we can both follow our dreams.

Eat together every day We always have dinner as a family at 5.30pm, which is early for us. But it's a nice way to catch up, it opens the kids up to new food and means we don't double up on cooking.

A small home saves time There's less to clean. We're always de-cluttering because we don't want to outgrow our space. Why move to a bigger house just to keep more stuff you have to look after?

Invest in yourself... When I started pottery classes seven years ago, I remember thinking, "I'll do this forever." I wasn't good, but I was determined. There's value in saying no to distractions.

Don't get hung up on the end result We renovated this cottage ourselves from scratch, so some things are a little wonky. But we learn as we go, and the kids grow up with the confidence to use their hands. Look for possibilities, not perfection.'
