- Employees are encouraged to park in the overflow meadow in back of the library, off Driftwood Road.





Faculty Member Carri LeRoy to Research Blast Zone, Thanks to Grant from National Science Foundation



Faculty member and freshwater ecologist Carri LeRoy has been awarded a \$200,000 research grant from the National Science Foundation to study how new streams and rivers form over time. LeRoy's research will focus in particular on the genetics of trees that grow in new stream ecosystems near Mt. St. Helens.

"Rivers are generally very old, carving through canyons and valleys over millennia," said LeRoy. "Because new streams and rivers are rare, little is known about how they form."

Mt. St. Helens, in Evergreen's own backyard, is a perfect place to find out more. "After catastrophic volcanic eruptions, water from springs and snowmelt carves fresh stream channels,"

LeRoy said. "The trees that colonize rivers and streams provide shade, shelter, and crucial inputs of leaves and wood to aquatic ecosystems.

Trees help shape the stream itself by stabilizing banks, creating meanders, and halting erosion."

By studying the genetic differences among trees near streams in the volcano's 1980 blast zone, LeRoy expects to learn about the variety of ways that different tree species, and different genders within a species, can affect other organisms and stream ecosystems overall.

The grant also provides funding for two undergraduate research assistants to work with LeRoy on the two-year project.
