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## Bevin plans pension fix without tax hike

**FRANKFORT** — Republican Gov. Matt Bevin says Kentucky's two-year spending plan must go "beyond break even," calling for the state to generate more money to fix the multibillion-dollar pension shortfalls that threaten the livelihoods of hundreds of

thousands of public workers, teachers and police.

But Bevin, preparing to deliver his first budget proposal to lawmakers in a televised speech Tuesday, said in an interview with The Associated Press that his solution will not raise taxes. Instead, Bevin said his plan will include sweeping what he called "found mon-

ies," including unexpected windfalls from lawsuit settlements and judgments, into the retirement systems. He pointed to the unprecedented \$870 million a judge has ordered an online poker company to pay the state as an example. That judgment is being appealed.

With every extra dollar going to the retirement system,

that means other programs might not get the increases they requested or, in some cases, could have their budgets cut.

"I am doing intentionally the least amount we can do," Bevin said about his proposed cuts. "I'm trying to solve this problem a step at a time. But it's going to come not by

dumping everybody on their ear."

Kentucky has one of the worst-funded pension systems in the country. Moody's, a national credit rating agency, says Kentucky's liability is nearly twice as large as the money it brings in every year.

## A surprise for 102nd birthday

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James "Mac" McWaters has seen more than most in life — much of it "not fit for print" he'll tell you — but even so, his 102nd birthday celebration Monday took him by surprise.

"I ain't ever seen this many people. Is all of Paducah here?" he said to the crowd of friends, family and fellow Brookdale residents gathered in the Brookdale community room for his party Monday.

"I'm sorry the president can't

be here, but I'm sure thankful all of you are. I didn't know I had that many friends. A lot of you maybe came because you don't know my history. You wouldn't have come if you did!"

At 102, McWaters is hard of hearing but sharp of wit. For every question asked of him Monday he had a quick retort, just about every one of them laugh-inducing. When a reporter asked him the inevitable question, "What's your secret, Mr. McWaters?" He answered, "Oh, I've been a good boy," which made him and several others chuckle.

"He's pretty sharp, and he can be very ornery, but I think the main thing I've learned from him is compassion," said Shirley Grimm, McWaters' daughter.

"His dad died when he was 6 months old. He was the youngest, but growing up he took care of everybody, and his mom lived to be two weeks short of 100. He took good care of her, looked after all of them one way or another. And of course, he's very proud of his World War II service."

## Graves residents to vote today on alcohol sales

Graves County voters will decide today whether the local option election will allow alcohol sales county-wide or follow other defeats for alcohol in the 1930s, '80s and '90s.

On Nov. 20, County Clerk Barry Kennemore announced that the group Vote Graves Wet 2015 had collected 2,373 certified signatures on its petition, which was 152 more than the 2,221 that were needed to hold

a local option election. The following Monday, Nov. 23, County Judge-Executive Jesse Perry set Jan. 26 as the date for the special election.

The yes-or-no ballot question voters will answer is, "Are you in favor of the sale of alcoholic beverages in Graves County, KY?" Kennemore said the same precincts from the last election will be used today, and voters should make sure to have some

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# EU police warn of more attacks by IS extremists

**PARIS** — Europe's top police agency issued a stark warning Monday: Islamic State extremists will keep attempting lethal attacks on soft targets in Europe as the militant group increasingly goes global.

Some 2½ months after suicide bombers and gunmen killed 130 people in Paris, the Europol agency said, "there is every reason to expect that IS, IS-inspired terrorists or another religiously inspired terrorist group will undertake a terrorist attack somewhere in Europe again, but particularly in France, intended to cause mass casualties among the civilian population."

The sobering conclusions reached by experts from the European Union's chief agency for law enforcement cooperation and EU member states make clear that many, perhaps virtually all in Europe, may be at risk.

"Without reliable intelligence on the intentions, activities and contacts and travels of known terrorists it is nearly impossible to exactly predict when and where the next terrorist attack will take place, and what form it will take," the Europol report said.

Hours before the report was issued, a new video was released by the Islamic State group celebrating the killers who carried out the Nov. 13 attacks in the French capital — while also threatening fresh bloodshed.

The grisly recording ends with one militant holding a severed head, footage of British Prime Minister David Cameron giving a speech, and an IS warning that whoever stands with the unbelievers "will be a target for our swords."

The 17-minute video, released Sunday, shows the extent of the planning that went into the multiple attacks in Paris, which French authorities have said from the beginning were planned in Syria. All nine men seen in the video died in the Paris attacks or their aftermath.

All but two of the attackers were from Belgium and France and spoke fluent French. The two others — identified by their noms de guerre as Iraqis — spoke in Arabic.

Seven of the militants, including a 20-year-old who was the youngest of the group, were shown standing behind bound captives, described as "apostates," who were either beheaded or shot.

"Soon on the Champs-Elysees," says Samy Amimour, who was raised in a Paris suburb, as he holds a captive's head aloft.

The Nov. 13 attacks targeted a packed concert hall, a restaurant and cafe, and a soccer match at the French national stadium. The video glorifying the Kalashnikov-wielding gunmen and suicide bombers responsible for that carnage was probably also meant as a recruitment tool.

man, but he does love to talk about the war. He got to see the world during his service with the U.S. Army, he said — the Philippines, England, France, Germany. But the only time he shot a gun was when he leaned one up against a tree and it went off. That's one of his favorite anecdotes.

When McWaters got out of the Army, he worked as a route salesman for Colonial Bread and also ran a car dealership on Paducah's south side. One of his gifts Monday was two black-and-white photos framed side-by-side, McWaters on the left and his old friend Buddy Thompson on the right, both posing with a foot propped on the bumper of a new car in McWaters' lot.

McWaters tinkered with cars and engines all his life, Grimm said.

"I grew up around him fixing things and jerry-rigging things," she said. "He had a mower that

he couldn't start, so he fixed up an engine with a pulley on it, and that's how he would start his mower. This was when he was 95, mowing the yard."

McWaters didn't move into the Brookdale community until two years ago when he lost Grimm's mother and his wife, Mary Ham McWaters.

"They were married 73 years," Grimm said. "I don't know how she did it. They must have been doing something right though."

About a year ago McWaters found a friend in Dot Lewis, a fellow centenarian and Brookdale resident who also lost her spouse a few years ago. They're "sweethearts," everyone says, but they won't let anyone call them a couple. Lewis' daughter said Monday that every time McWaters leaves the dining room at lunch he'll give Lewis a kiss on the forehead and she'll tell him, "I'm a married woman!"

Lewis never left McWaters' side Monday afternoon. Even

when the party was at its loudest with the band playing and people talking, McWaters was entirely focused on Lewis, making sure she had enough to drink and liked her cake.

Chris Everett, the activities director at Brookdale, said she's betting they'll be voted King and Queen of the community's Valentine's Day celebration next month.

McWaters insisted Monday that he wasn't going to brag, but that he's had a good life.

"Just don't make it out like I'm smarter than anybody," he said. "Because I'm not. I've had a big life, I have. But being old like this is not what I expected it to be. I'm not a public man. I've never had nothing like this. If you want to say something, say 'He had a nice birthday.' That's my statement."

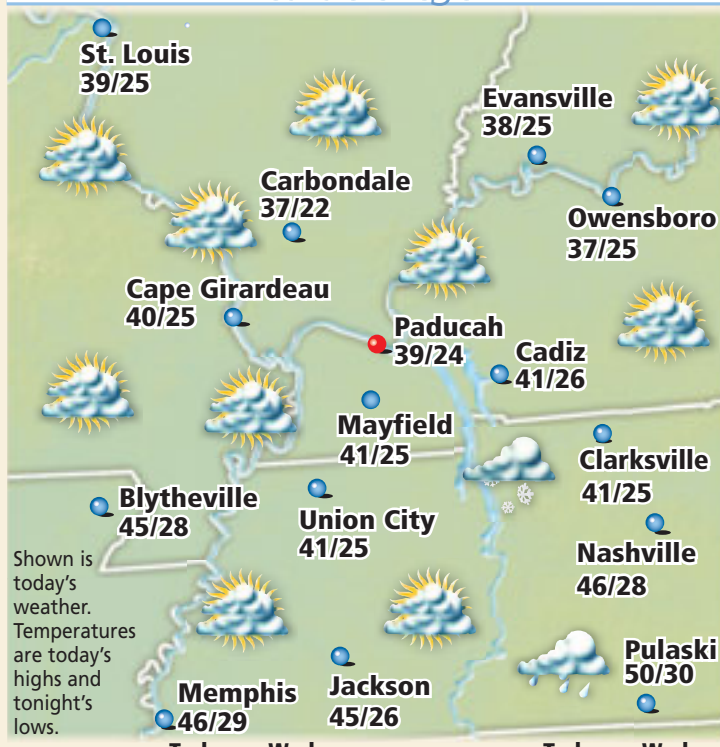

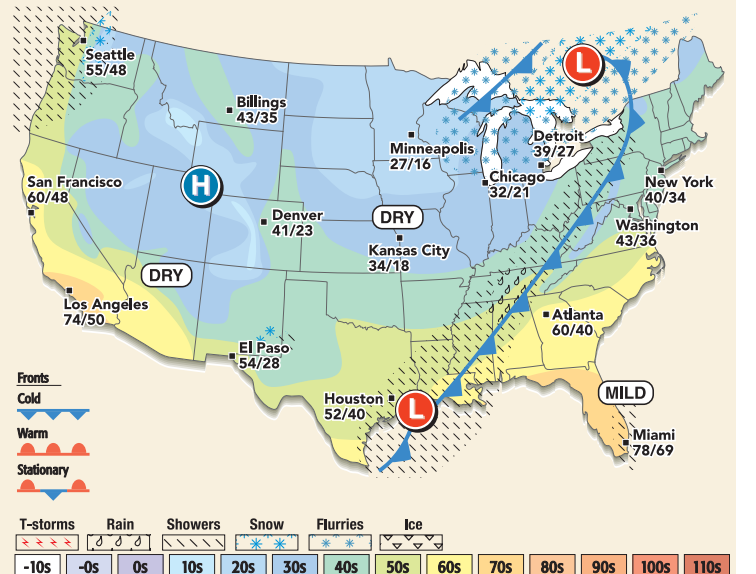
