

Judge Fox retires from bench after 20 years

GARDNER — Judge Patrick A. Fox realized before being appointed 20 years ago that he wouldn't make everyone happy with his decisions, but he made a promise to treat people fairly and respectfully, while also upholding the dignity of the

Many of those in attendance at a retirement party in Gardner and Winchendon District Court Friday felt he managed to live up to that expectation. They honored Judge Fox with words of praise mixed in with a few comical stories.

"He made it look so easy I thought I could do it," said Judge Arthur Haley, who called Judge Fox a mentor. "It's not as easy as Pat Fox made it look."

Retired Judge John Curran acted as master of ceremonies for the event, which included several citation presentations to

Judge Fox. "There are a number of his colleagues here today who

honor him by their presence,' Judge Curran said.

Judge Fox, 63, completed his final day on the job Friday, leaving a career that started in what was then known as the Spencer District Court in 1990. Before walking out of the Gardner and Winchendon court he has been assigned to as chief justice since 1997, the Sterling resident recalled his time on the

Judge Fox said he'll particularly miss the challenge of dealing with complex issues of the law and working with the staff.

"They've always been very helpful and courteous. ... I'll miss being associated with them," he said. "They made it a pleasure to come to work every

A former public defender who started out working in a Worcester office in 1973, Judge Fox said he also appreciated the interaction with defense lawyers and attorney's of the commonwealth.

themselves in my tenure here with courtesy and respect and professionalism," he said. "It was a pleasure to have them appear before me and interact with them professionally."

While he couldn't point to any case that stood out more than others over the years, Judge Fox said he enjoyed helping some people make progress to turn their lives around.

"It doesn't happen in every instance and in every case before you, but it happened frequently enough to be a real worthwhile aspect of the job," he said.

PHILLIPSTON — More than a week after Phillipston residents at the May 5 Annual Town Meeting voted to appropriate \$25,000 for costs related to the affordable senior housing project, townspeople had an opportunity this week to present their ideas to project officials on what they want to see at the proposed center.
