A Hidden Truffle – A Quick Review of Pig

On a whim, I decided to watch a film simply titled *Pig* and I didn't know what to expect from this latest outing from Nicolas Cage. I know that's already a mouthful of a premise right there but trust me, its fully aware of its absurdity and yet expertly follows through with powerful dialogue and visual storytelling to drive its point home. Both written and directed by Michael Sarnoski, this film could definitely be a sleeper hit that may be skipped by many due to its seemingly campy revenge fueled narrative, but I assure you it's not about revenge at all. There is beautiful camerawork throughout Pig along with subtle but effective sound and music choices that stir the senses. The performances are pretty strong across the board but Nicolas Cage in particular gives one of his best performances in years, differing greatly from the pure insanity of his role in the film Mandy. I almost don't wanna say anything more about this strange film other than to go see it.
