Scooter the DJ and Johnny Wild and the Delights from the squares to the seas each year, as well as pursue other interests onboard a cruise ship, contributing to what has become an industry-wide travel trajectory.

Tracey Codd, franchise owner of Expedia CruiseShip-Centers, including the one in Colony Plaza, said Expedia Cruises has seen more than five times the passengers on themed cruises already in 2019 as compared to 2018.

Expedia Cruises offers a number of themed cruises, including Rocky and the Rollers' "Rockin" Cruises.

"We offer all of the major cruise lines and there are approximately 20 million cruisers a year," Codd said. "Themed cruises are growing rapidly in popularity."

Themed cruises offer a space for people with niche interests to get together and celebrate those interests, whether it's a genre of music, an era, a sport, a culture or an activity.

"I think a themed cruise provides guests with a unique opportunity to choose to participate in an activity they enjoy while they are cruising on the high seas," said Greg Lovelace, director of marketing and business development at Port Tampa Bay. "It's like a vacation within a vacation."

Villagers have been known to cruise with their favorite bands, celebrities and sports players and even enjoy Halloween, disc golf, pickleball, cooking, wine-

drinking and charity cruises.
Onboard a Rockin' cruise,
Henkle and his fellow cruisers
attend sock hops, prom nights
and private concerts featuring
not only Rocky and the Rollers,
but acts such as The Shirelles
and Gary Puckett & The Union

Village Palo Alto residents Mark and Marcia Adams hopped aboard the Legendary Rhythm & Blues Cruise and jammed until dawn, while Kathy and Lou Peters, of the Village of Caroline, played water games with their favorite former and current Steelers football players on the Legends of Pittsburgh Cruise.

Because themed cruises are coordinated by varying entities — private organizations, travel agencies or cruise lines — it is difficult to calculate just what percentage of cruises are themed, but it is a trend that is definitely gaining popularity, according to Doug Wheeler, president and CEO of the Florida Ports Council.

"We've seen a shift in the past decade where travelers want to invest in experiences rather than buying new things," Wheeler said. "Cruise lines continue to increase 'onboard experience' offerings and themed cruising taps into this movement combining an experience with a relaxing vacation."

Themed cruises also give individual travel agencies an exclusive product for clients to enjoy, according to Codd.

"Villagers love to travel in packs, so it really works well," Codd said. "It's a big business in The Villages. It's an incredible market and an incredible opportunity for them."

Those who go on themed cruises enjoy an indulgence in a hobby or interest on top of a vacation.

Cruising is also just a more convenient way to travel for many people.

"I think they like that everything is packaged together," said Jane-Ellen Greenwood, a travel consultant with Greenwood Cruise and Travel, which offers Scooter the DJ's Scooter Cruises. "People generally take a bus from The Villages. It's a little bit safer, and you don't have to travel completely on your own."

And Villagers are in a good location to enjoy cruising of any kind, at only approximately 90 miles from Port Tampa Bay and 100 miles from Port Canaveral.

And it's no secret that Florida is the world leader in the cruise

In 2018, 16.8 million people hopped on a cruise that embarked from a Florida port, a 4.4 percent increase from 2017, according to Wheeler. The state is home to the top three cruise ports in the world, and the state's seaports account for nearly two-thirds of all U.S. Cruise embarkations.

In fact, more than half of cruise passengers worldwide sailed from a Florida port in 2018, according to Greg Lovelace, director of marketing and business development at Port Tampa Bay.

"According to the Florida Caribbean Cruise Association, the cruise industry is the fastest-growing category in the leisure travel market," Lovelace said.

The interest in themed cruises among people 55 and older has positively impacted business for local travel agents, as well as the cruise industry.

The travel trend is popular with retired people because they have more time to enjoy life and pursue specific interests, according to Greenwood.

"(Interest in themed cruises) has grown quite a bit," said Greenwood, of the Village of St. James. "I've been here for six

years, and in the last six years, it's probably quadrupled my business."

Traveling in groups goes hand in hand with themed cruising. Groups anywhere from 10 to 100 embark on themed cruises, Greenwood said.

Codd said more often than not, people tell her that on themed cruises, they don't even have to get off the ship if they don't want to.

In fact, many cruisers are beginning to prefer themed cruises.

"I like them because you get the entertainment that you want," said Village of Osceola Hills resident Karla Millsap, who has been on several blues music cruises. "The music is pretty much 24/7. I think they're so much better than going to a festival, because you have the convenience of going back to your room or having the good food."

Travelers can also embark on themed river cruises.

Chuck and Marsha Solms, of the Village of Bonita, have been on two classical music Amadeus River Cruises.

"Our two passions are golf and classical music," Chuck said. "I like river cruising, but my wife would rather be on a big cruise ship. So that's why we picked a themed cruise. It gives us some direction. Certainly other cruises are nice, but I think we would get bored. A themed cruise gives you something to do besides the usual things."

On the cruises, they went to music museums, listened to maestros give lectures and attended various recitals.

"It was just wonderful because all of the entertainment onboard the ship and all of the excursions off the ship had to do with classical music," Marsha said

Marsha said.

There's also a sense of community on themed cruises that is not as present in a regular cruise. Because passengers of themed cruises are surrounded by others with similar interests, there's something to bond over and talk about.

"You develop a camaraderie with everyone, because they're there for the same reasons," said Village of Liberty Park resident Fran Kilroy, who enjoyed an Irish-themed cruise. "They're usually very friendly. If it's something you can participate in, like dancing, that really helps."

# For Many, Cruising Is More Than a Vacation, It's a Lifestyle

For some people a cruise is a vacation, for others it's a way of life. Jill Kohler has been on 116 cruises. "The most cruises I've been on in a year was 10," said Kohler, of the Village of Polo Ridge. "And it's always at the last minute. Sometimes I learn about it on a Wednesday and I leave on a Saturday." Kohler is originally from New York City and started cruising in the early '80s.

'You unpack and pack once,' Kohler said. "You're not living out of a suitcase. You don't have to carry around luggage from hotel to hotel. On a cruise, you empty it and you're free. All your meals are prepared. You don't have to look for restaurants."





# Villages Performers Take Shows To Sea

Villagers will follow their favorite local entertainers anywhere — from the tropical

Caribbean to chilly Alaska. Thousands of Villagers hop on a ship with Rocky and the Rollers, Johnny Wild and the Delights and Scooter the DJ each year as they embark away from the squares for something extra with their highestranking fans.

And since the cruises are themed around the bands, fans enjoy private concerts, interaction with band members, new content and more.

#### **Rocky and the Rollers**

It all started when Gerry "Rocky" Seader started rockin' the Caribbean about 15 years

Seader, founder of Rocky and the Rollers, used to work on cruises and noticed there weren't a lot of events on the

ships.
"There was nothing going on, so I came up with the idea to do Rockin' the Caribbean," Seader said. "We started doing it here in The Villages. There were about 400 people and 350 of them were Villagers. It just started growing from there."

Now Seader takes fans on three or four cruises a year with 800 people attending each cruise. His cruises, which include popular music groups from the '60s, go to the Caribbean and to Alaska. In 2020, the cruise will go to Australia for the first time.

Rocky and the Rollers cruises are now exclusive with Expedia CruiseShipCenters.

"So we don't just get Villagers, we get people from around the world and around the country," Seader said.

This helps bring awareness to The Villages, according to Seader. Non-Villagers notice all the Villagers on the ship and wonder what The Villages

"After they find out, they come visit," Seader said. "I know of a few who have bought houses because of it." The Rocky and the Rollers

cruises also feature other acts, such as The Shirelles and Gary Puckett & The Union Gap. There are numerous shows

and five themed dances per week, including a sock hop and a prom night.

When we do the prom night, we pick a king and a queen, and on most of the cruises I've done now, people will come up to me afterward crying," Seader said.

Seader remembers one woman who said she never got to go to her high-school prom because her husband had to go to Vietnam. Attending prom night on the cruise was a sort of do-over for them.

"Our cruises are sometimes a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for people," Seader said.
"A lot of people are reliving their youth and doing a bucket list at the same time. I think that's kind of neat and what's so different about themed

cruises. Bart Henkle, of the Village Rio Grande, has been on six Rocky and the Rollers cruises and is booked for a seventh in

November. Henkle said he's been to the Caribbean about a dozen times, and by the time the ship reaches the third port, he's not always interested in getting off

of the ship. "Having stuff to do on the ship is great," Henkle said. "I just enjoy every member of the band. The piano player works out every day on the ship and so do I, so we're always doing treadmills and weights together because we eat so much on the ship."

Though the next Rocky and the Rollers cruise in November is mostly booked, the band has two cruises in February that are on sale now. To sign up, visit the Expedia Cruise Ship Center at 313 Colony Blvd. in The Villages.

#### **Johnny Wild** and the Delights

Johnny Wild and the Delights wanted to give something extra to their most loyal fans.

'We have this group of fans that come to every show," said Andy Matchett, lead singer in who are having a good time with us regularly."

Matchett said on the band's cruises, which are weeklong annual excursions usually in April, the group tries to put on shows that the fans haven't seen before. They add new material, do special

dedications for the people who are on the cruise and host themed dances.

"The people who come on the cruise are like VIPs to us," Matchett said. "We hang out with them and get to know them a little better. They see us at dinner. It's like creating an extended family, almost. This offers the chance for anyone who wants to get to know us a little better."

On his most recent cruise, Matchett did a full, unplugged set in the cocktail lounge.

"We had the power go out on the (The Villages town) square once, and the sound system wasn't working," Matchett said. "We still had time left to kill, so I grabbed the acoustic guitar and had the audience sitting around me as I played, and people really responded to that, so I tried to recreate it on the ship.

So Matchett did an acoustic sing-along on the cruise, and it went really well.

The intimacy of the experi ence is a big part of the draw for everyone.

It's also a good change of scenery for the band, Matchett

"It's kind of like a vacation for us at the same time, and that's a really big help in a year when we're so busy and playing so frequently," Matchett said. 'This allows us to take a trip but also to do something that celebrates the band with our closest fans.'

Allen and Marijane Sunnock, of the Village of Ashland, have been on two Johnny Wild Cruises and enjoyed the band's private concerts and friendliness.

"You can interact with them," Allen said. "My wife and I were going to do zip lining, and we were sitting down waiting and there were two people next to us who were with the band. They took a video of us zip lining and emailed it to us. That's the kind of people they are. It's really fun spending time with them.'




