Hailstorm Repairs Now Complete

In May of 2014, a localized hailstorm tore through Danville and caused enormous damage to cars and buildings. All 112 cottages at the Meadows were affected, as were the Manor, Emmanuel, Nazareth, and the Meadows Community Center.

Don Katherman, Maria Joseph Facilities and Environmental Services Director, reports that all of the repairs are now complete. He appreciates the residents' cooperation during the long process.

"We tried to keep everyone informed, and I give the residents a

lot of credit for waiting patiently," he said.

"The repairs were prioritized, with any safety concerns taken care of first, such as windows and roofs," he added.

Siding and gutters came next, with removal from one cottage at a time, then replacements in a continuing cycle. At Emmanuel, The Manor, and the Community Center, significant roof damage occurred and many windows had to

be replaced. Nazareth was the least affected, with just a few windows and part of the roof damaged.

In all of the parking lots, cars belonging to employees, visitors, and residents were damaged with dents and broken windows. Some people waited months for repairs since area auto shops couldn't keep up with the influx of repairs.

Don said Maria Joseph was fortunate to hire a contractor that could dedicate all of their time to the project. The estimated cost of the damages to the Maria Joseph campus is over \$1 million, most of which was covered by insurance.

Manor Resident Shares World War II Experiences

For Margaret Dugan, 94, the late 70s television show, *MASH*, has personal meaning. The Manor resident served as a nurse in England during World War II, and she says the conditions were just like those portrayed in MASH, although it was a different war.


"We worked in tents and lived in brick huts with no running water, a potbellied stove, and latrines located a city block away." Margaret adds that medical supplies were inadequate and each nurse was responsible for up to 12 patients at a time.

"We made do with what we had," Margaret says. "It was so hard to see all those young men injured and traumatized by the war." She served in the Women's Army Corps, as a lieutenant, from 1944 to 1946.

She met her husband-to-be, Nicholas, in the United States before both went into the service. (He

is now deceased). Margaret shared that her fiancé visited her at the medical camp a few times during his service in Germany. "Since he was a lower rank, a corporal, he had to walk behind me at all times," she said. They married after the war and settled in Allentown, where they had 7 children and eventually 19 grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren.

When their youngest child went to school, Margaret returned to work as an R.N. Her last job was at the Phoebe Home in Allentown, retiring at age 68.

Margaret's children are now scattered throughout the country, but frequently gather in the family home in the Poconos. A daughter in Danville, Diane Giacomo, often takes Margaret to the Poconos.

Margaret says she loves living at the Manor, where she has made many friends. "The staff here do a great job. I find it very homey," she said. In addition to attending activities for residents, she spends time painting water colors and quilting.

In 2013 and 2015, Margaret had the honor of being named Grand Marshall for the Danville Veterans Day parade. "I consider myself a very lucky person," she shared. "Life has been good to me."

Sadie Krywicki says she treats residents as her own family as the new director of activities at Emmanuel Center. She first got interested in helping the elderly when her grandmother was diagnosed with Alzheimer's four years ago. "I realized how important it was for me to spend time with her – how much she just appreciated reminiscing and doing activities like painting her nails." Sadie also observed the staff at the nursing home treating her grandmother with love and respect.

Sadie's most recent job was as a patient access coordinator at Geisinger. She completed a degree in education in Arkansas, where she grew up, and while there did job shadowing with intellectually disabled people. She also volunteered with the Special Olympics. "I liked working with people that other people sometimes can't relate to," she said. "I love being here at Maria Joseph, Sadie added. "I wake up in the morning excited to go to work and



see how everyone is doing." In her position as director, she oversees five activities staff and helps to coordinate a variety of activities.

Sadie said musical entertainment is especially popular. "It's amazing how people who may struggle with communication, such as those with Alzheimer's, respond so well to music and participate in sing-alongs," she shared. Bingo is also a favorite activity, as well as birthday socials and outdoor walks.

"It's wonderful to make people smile," she says. "it's the little things that matter. Just keeping upbeat and positive is so important in this job."

"The only experience I had working with the elderly was doing my grandparents' hair, but I'm really enjoying this," she said. "It gives me a good feeling to know I'm doing something that is good for everyone. It's great to see all the smiles."

Ashley has held her hair stylist license for five years, graduating from Sun Area Technical Institute

Some residents come every day to have their hair done, while others come weekly or monthly. The most popular service is a perm, which costs \$40. She works closely with the sales staff and with the facilities and activities directors.
