

How to Clean your Window like a Professional Cleaner

Cleaning the window and its glasses is not a challenging task if you ideally have the idea for it. Meeting all the ends during cleaning proves that you know about the same.

However, what if you don't have enough ideas? You don't need to get worried. We are going to show you the cleaning process step-by-step. It will clear your concept, and you don't need a professional the next time.

Equipment

- Bucket of warm water
- Vinegar
- Window cleaning solution
- **Electric spin scrubber** Dry towel
- Swiffer mop

How to clean your interior windows

Your interior window is not exposed to direct sunlight and dust; it is probably cleaner than the outside. So, you can start by cleaning the windows inside.

- **Rinse**- You should start rinsing the windows with soap and an **electric cleaning brush**. Check the areas if there is any stain and rub the entire window. You should do this at least 2-3 times based on the window condition.

- **Dry-** Now, use a towel to dry the window for a streak-free finish. You can use long and strong movements to avoid streaks on the clean windows from one direction to another. However, you can rinse and dry for the second time if your window looks dirtier.
- **Spray-** Fill a window cleaning solution spray bottle halfway with white vinegar and spray the windows, starting at the top and working your way down. White vinegar is one of the most fantastic window cleaners, and it's inexpensive and simple to come by. You may also use a window cleaning solution or product developed for cleaning windows at home.
- **Wipe-** Wipe the vinegar off the window with quick strokes in the same direction as you dried it. If there are stubborn streaks, you may need to spray and wipe the same area many times. This is the last and most critical phase in the process. Make sure you're not leaving any drips or streaks by using steady motions.

How to clean the exterior windows

The external windows are likely to be significantly dirtier than the interior windows. Outside, dust, grime, pollen, rain splatters, and even dead bugs may collect on the glass. As a result, you'll need to spend a little more time outside.

- **Rinse-** Like the interior window and glasses, you should rinse it with an electric spin scrubber and liquid soap. Begin with one that will collect the majority of dirt and pollen. Switch to a second moist rag and clean the area once more to remove any leftover dirt. Allowing the window to lie wet for too long may cause streaks and watermarks because the air and sun will dry it before you can wipe away the water, leaving streaks and watermarks.
- **Dry-** Keep a dry cloth on hand to wipe away the soap and water as soon as possible. Outside, this is much more critical than indoors. The water will dry faster since the window is exposed to more breeze and sun. You'll get streaks on the glass if you let the water dry naturally rather than using a dry towel. Always begin at the top and work your way down the window, making smooth, forceful motions from one side to the other.
- **Wipe-** Wipe away the vinegar using steady, vigorous motions from side to side, careful not to leave any streaks or drips.

Do you need a streak free clean? Here we go-

You can take a few things to ensure that your windows are streak-free after cleaning.

- When wiping the solution from the glass, always use a lint-free, extremely soft wipe. A microfiber cloth is just what you need, but many individuals don't have one on hand. If you don't have one, a clean paper towel will work. To avoid streaks, rub the solution in numerous directions.
- Any glass cleaner with an alcohol or ammonia basis should be avoided. Although this may lead you to believe they would provide a better clean, they might leave streaks or a thin coating that draws moisture and dust. If you have a tough stain to remove, rubbing alcohol or acetone can be applied to a cloth and rubbed directly on the stain to expedite the process. Before continuing to clean your window, as usual, wipe the area dry.
- If you've washed your window but still see streaks that you can't seem to get rid of, give it a good rinse with clean water and let it dry. Any residual cleaning solution may be stripped away as a result of this.
- Scraping them off your glass with a blade or a razor is never a good idea. This can scrape the surface of your windows, making them far more prone to shattering under pressure in the future.

Few windows cleaning tips-

- Use an **electric spin scrubber** or cordless 360 electric spin scrubber. It will save your time and give you maximum cleaning.
- Any dishwashing detergent will remove grime and oil from the glass while making it slick for your squeegee to slide across. Outside, delicate plants will be protected with a soap that is 100 percent biodegradable. It will safeguard children and dogs who place their mouths on the windows or sills inside.
- Use a lint roller to clean window screens.
- When it comes to washing your windows, cloudy weather is your best friend. This is because it allows the cleaner to stay moist on your windows for longer, reducing the risk of it drying on you and leaving a film or residue. It may also be easier to spot streaks while working if the light isn't shining directly on you.
