## The difference between 'compared with' and 'compared to'

Though it's very subtle, comparing something 'with' something is different to comparing something 'to' something.

While 'compared to' highlights a likeness between two things, 'compared with' does the opposite: it contrasts them.

As grammatical misdemeanors go, it's certainly not the biggest. But as we often use comparisons to prove the superiority of our products and solutions, it's certainly worth knowing the difference.

Let's look at an example. While we would say the impact of TiUnite on patient care compares <u>to</u> that of other great dental innovations (as they have a similarly positive effect), we would say we are comparing TiUnite implants <u>with</u> machined implants (as we're examining them against one another, primarily to establish the differences).

### How Shakespeare can help

A good trick for remembering which one to use is to think of the famous Shakespeare quote: "Shall I compare thee <u>to</u> a summer's day". Here the Bard is looking for the <u>similarities</u> between the object of his affection and the warmth and beauty of summer, not the differences.

Here are a couple more examples:

– Let's compare our results with those of our competitors (we're looking to examine them side by side, primarily for <u>differences</u>)

– We can compare our results  $\underline{to}$  those of our competitors (there is  $\underline{similarity}$ , they are alike)

 Compared with other implants, NobelActive may offer higher primary stability (higher primary stability can be the <u>difference</u> between NobelActive and other implants).

- I'd compare this surgeon to the best in the world (the surgeon is similar to the best, they are alike).

So, to sum up, if you're looking to highlight that things are similar, use "compared
