## What is your favorite joke or moment from the show?

There are so many. I love that Iim and Pam wrote "Hot Dog Fingers" on their insurance form in Season Two. I love when Michael goes on an angry tirade about how he burned his foot on his George Forman grill. I love when Dwight and Kelly look up Mike Tibbits on their computer. On an emotional level, one of my favorite moments is when Jim comes back from New York and asks Pam on a date.

## Who was your favorite guest star?

We've worked with so many great people over the years — James Spader, Kathy Bates, Will Ferrell. They were all so great. But we've also had some very, very, funny folks who are lesser known. Two of my favorites were Andrew Daly, who played Ben Franklin in Season Three, and Brett Gelman, who played the magician in Season Eight. Those guys made me laugh a lot. In both cases I had a hard time getting through the scenes.

## You get to write one more episode — what happens?

I've always wanted to have an episode where Jim and Pam and Dwight and Angela go on a double date. I'm not sure what happens, but I imagine it would be pretty fun.

The last one.

I took all of Pam's jewelry—the stuff I wore every day. Her wedding ring, necklace, earrings,

If you could hire one Dunder Mifflin employee who would it be and why?

Believe it or not, Dwight. He's loyal, dependable, and a hard worker. And any of the stuff that might seem annoying at first would become charming over time.

I wish we had time to do the Lackawanna Coal Mine Tour that Michael talks about in Season One.

## When you started OfficeTally, did you ever imagine it would grow as large as it has?

No! It's honestly surpassed my wildest dreams. When I started it back in 2006, I was lucky to get 100 page views a day. Now I average about 20,000. OfficeTally has been viewed over 76 million times over the years, which is quite astounding to me. I am super happy to have played a role in the show's fan experience.

## What's been the best part of being the most famous Office

I've had some amazing experiences because of OfficeTally — visiting The Office set multiple times, getting a cameo appearance in Season 5's Company Picnic, moderating a writers panel at Paley Center in Los Angeles, and attending 2007's Office Convention here in Scranton — which was like a rock star experience! But I think the best part has been meeting The Office's amazing fan base — some of the nicest, most creative, and most funny people I've ever met!

So many favorite moments, so many favorite lines! I can tell you, though, that my favorite overarching theme is "everybody pitches in to help or have fun"— so like Traveling Salesmen, Cafe Disco, The Sting, and from this season, The Whale.
