Putting together a care package for our soldiers is one thing that can bring families together despite the distance between them. For some of us, this is our first deployment and we're not sure what to send or where to start. For others, this is not our first rodeo but maybe this time you are looking for different ideas and tips of what to send. Care packages can be sent for many different reasons and some are packed for certain occasions such as thinking of you, birthdays, and other holidays.

The majority of our military enjoy receiving care packages because they contain reminders from home that bring a sense of familiarization and comfortability. Family members can enjoy putting these packages together as they gather all of their soldiers favorite items, needed items and are able to customize the inside of the box.

Handwritten letters can hit close to home with soldiers who miss their loved ones. Holding onto something "homemade" can mean so much to someone who is far away from home. Items such as footballs, other sports balls, card games and board games are a great way to send "fun in a box" for your soldier and his or her friends. Personalizing the inside of the care package is a fun way to celebrate upcoming holidays and special occasions. Whether you are a parent, spouse, friend or other there are thousands of ideas out there to help get you started.

There are different resources families can use throughout the state to help with care packages. The United States Postal Service offers a free "military care kit" with the necessary supplies such as, packing tape, boxes and forms, for sending packages overseas. By visiting the USPS website, you can order your kit and it will arrive at your door in 5-7 business days. Another organization that can help with sending packages is the Military Missions in Action.

WHAT TO PUT IN THE PACKAGE

- Quick protein protein bars, beef jerky, etc.
- Air freshners
- · Hand warmers
- Deck of cards UNO and other card games will provide a variety of entertainment
- Crossword/Sudoku booklet
- Reading materials
- Candy

TIPS TO REMEMBER

Seal everything - Make sure to seal food, liquids and other contents in zip lock bags. Gallon bags work best for bigger items. The trip for these products is long a bumpy, if a liquid were to spill sealing everything prevents other products from being ruined.

Pack it tight but don't overstuff - It's easy to get carried away when we want to send them all the love! Overstuffing the box may cause it to open while in transit and your soldier will not get the contents. Send two packages if you have many items to send.

Secure all seems - Make sure to tape down all edges so that the box does not open while in transit.

Personalizing - The easiest way to personalize the inside of the box is to tape down wrapping paper or construction paper depending on what you want to do. Let your mind run free here and be creative!

Think small - Individual items will travel best in the package. If you buy a box of protein bars it will clear some room to take them out of the box and put them in a zip lock bag or place them strategically around the box where they fit through the other items.






If You Want It, Go Get It: A Glimpse in the Life of North Carolina Air National Guard's First Female

Raven

Since it's inception in 2007, the Phoenix Raven program, via Air Mobility Command headquarters, has graduated more than 3,000 trained individuals, including most recently, Staff Sgt. Lyndanesha Martin, 145th Security Forces Squadron.

"Being a Raven in the Air National Guard is like having a special duty, you are always in Security Forces but you can get picked up for jobs if they need you," explained Staff Sgt. Martin. "You have to stay conditioned and continue performance evaluations for it."

The Phoenix Raven program is a four-week training in which a selected few individuals from Security Forces are chosen to provide security for Air Mobility Command aircraft flying through and landing in high threat areas. The first step to becoming a Phoenix Raven starts at home base by expressing interest in the program, then by completing an indoctrination course that prepares the individual for what to expect at the four-week program.

"The first week we worked on ASP (Armament Systems and Procedures)/ baton training, the next week we worked on combative initiatives and throwing people around, the third week was weapons takeaway, which I enjoyed, and we fought each other that week," explained Staff Sgt.

Martin. "Everyone thought I did well in the small circle fight against a man that was much taller than me. I took him to the ground, which he did not expect. It was hard because he was heavy but I did it. Week four was classroom and field training exercises plus tests and running six miles."

With long training days and a packed syllabus, becoming a Raven is not for the faint of heart.

"We started with 36 and dropped to 34," expressed Staff Sgt. Martin. "Raven is a whole different mindset; you have to be mentally ready for that school, it's not just physical. You have to hold in your emotions while working 14-hour days and missing family."

Staff Sgt. Martin had a unique motivator to boost her confidence through the Phoenix Raven program.

"I had a time when I wanted to quit and I didn't want to do it anymore, but then Master Sgt. Mark Dow, my supervisor at the time, was talking to me while we were running and through his guidance and joining Cross-Fit, I felt more confident," explained Staff Sgt. Martin. "It was funny because I felt like I wasn't progressing physically so I joined Cross-fit and I love it now. I was telling the gym owner the other day that I joined Cross-Fit to become a Raven and I just went through the school and since I'd been going for so long before attending the training that I forgot that's why I joined and it helped me so much!"

Now that Staff Sgt. Martin is officially a Raven, she may be called up to complete her duties.

"I don't know what's next," says Staff Sgt. Martin.
"I think it will be an easy juggle with my civilian life and military life because I don't have to go on every mission.
There are so many options! I hope to go on a stage which is when you go somewhere that flies out a lot--they're out of places like Germany."

While she may be the first, she is likely not the last female Raven to cross into the North Carolina Air National Guard.

"We have another one [female] that might be trying to go into the Phoenix Raven Program soon," said Staff Sgt. Martin. "I think if there's something out there that you want, then go get it!"

NABC Recycled Rides Program Gifts North Carolina Guard Soliders Cars at USAA's 100th

Anniversary Event

To celebrate 100 years of service, USAA, in partnership with the National Auto Body Council's Recycled Rides program, gifted cars to three Soldiers from the North Carolina National Guard.

Specialist Matthew Gibson, Specialist Miresa Jote and Specialist Ethan Moore were gifted the cars at USAA's celebration event in Charlotte, North Carolina on Sept. 15, 2022.

The Soldiers were nominated by their chain-of-command after experiencing unique hardships that left them without reliable transportation.

"It's great to be able to help people. We like to say we're giving a hand up not a hand out," said Dale Ross, National Auto Body Council's Recycled Rides program manager.


Established in 2007, the National Auto Body Council is an association of members of the collision repair industry (insurance, car rental and collision repair).

Each vehicle is donated by either the insurance or rental companies, then the collision repair company repairs the vehicle to pre-accident condition.

The Recycled Rides program works with local charities to give the vehicles to those in need, with 75% of them going to veterans or service members.

"We represent all these great people in our industry...we just pull them together. It's the great people in the collision repair industry that donate the vehicle and donate their time to





fix it and donate parts and materials," Ross said. "And that's the real story...they're just generous people that are so happy to help out and to know that they're helping someone that really deserves it."

Specialist Ethan Moore, of the 210th Military Police Company, was grateful to receive the new car after his truck broke down.

"I'm extremely happy...I've been looking for a car for a while. It's the exact car I've been looking for too," said Moore.

Specialist Matthew Gibson, of the 105th Military Police Battalion, was thankful to receive the new car after his car was totaled in a collision a year ago. He also shared some advice to other service members in need.

"Don't be afraid to reach out and talk to the peers around you. Because nobody is going to turn you down or shun you away if you actually need help," said Gibson.

The Recycled Rides program has gifted more than 3,000 vehicles, valued at \$42 million to local communities across the country. This year, 300 vehicles will be donated.

USAA plans to give 100 cars away by the end of 2022 to veterans and service members across the country to commemorate their 100-year anniversary.

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New Commander for Wilmington Based NC Guard Infantry Battalion

DeLaney assumed command from U.S. Army Lt. Col. Benjamin R. Wynn who led the battalion through various training, missions, and deployments.

The battalion welcomed DeLaney as families, friends, and Soldiers witnessed the change of command.

Both leaders, DeLaney and Wynn, with U.S. Army Command Sgt. Maj. Jason Stewart, the regiment's most senior enlisted Soldier, and U.S. Army Col. Charles Morrison, the commander of the 30th Armored Brigade Combat Team formalized the change of command with the ceremonial passing of the colors, a flag that is the symbol of the regiment.

With the passing of the colors from Wynn to DeLaney and a final salute to end the ceremony, DeLaney took command.

"My time with you is over but I know that each of you will write a new chapter in the history of our battalion and regiment. How that chapter will read, however, is up to each

of you... How you care for your weapons and equipment will write volumes in our new history," said Wynn.

"Major DeLaney, good luck, I know you will do well," said Wynn. "Strength and Honor, Remember Mortain."

During his speech, DeLaney honored Wynn for his two years of service commanding the more than 600 Soldiers of the battalion.

"Thank you [Wynn] for building a world-class culture in the Tusk Hog Battalion. You have always been a great mentor and a better friend. I pray that I can take the torch and make you proud of where the infantry battalion can go," said DeLaney.

DeLaney officially assumed command on Nov. 30, 2022.

The battalion has several subordinate units located throughout southeastern North Carolina with its headquarters in Wilmington.

They have a long history of service to our state and nation including deployments for World War I, World War II, the Global War on Terror, and numerous state active duty deployments.

They are nicknamed the "Tusk Hogs" and their regimental motto is "Virtue Kindles Strength."

NCNG Engineers prepare for Deployment to Africa

Torth Carolina National Guard Soldiers with the 258th Engineer Utilities Det., 505th Engineer Battalion, 130th Maneuver Enhancement Brigade received their official send-off during a deployment ceremony at the Soldier Memorial Sports Arena in Butner, North Carolina, Nov. 19, 2022.

"When we start a building project there's nothing there, and by the end, there's something to show for your time," Sain said. "We're leaving it there forever and they will put it to good use. It's something we can feel good about."

The 258th will be supporting Combined Joint Task Force-Horn of Africa which conducts operations to enhance partner nation capacity, promote regional stability, dissuade conflict, and protect U.S. and coalition interests.


