In recent news, football players everywhere are kneeling and raising a fist during the National Anthem. This protest is known as "Trump vs. The NFL."

It has been somewhat of a controversy across the nation, affecting people differently.

Most right-wing conservatives believe it is ungrateful that football players profit so much in this country from "playing ball" and in return, disrespect our flag, country and national anthem.

On the other hand, left-wing liberals think they are executing their first amendment right of freedom of speech, and agree with what they are protesting against—racial injustice.

This rebellious act has been linked to players refusing to visit the White House upon invitation. "It's all a show," says Davis. "Just because you have the right does not mean it is right."
