1. LOOK TO THE SKY

Sydney Observatory isn't only worth visiting by night. Daytime viewings let you see the sun, stars and even the moon or Venus. Plus, there's time to check out the exhibits. Viewings are every day at 11am, noon, 2.30pm and 3.30pm, \$10/\$8. More: sydneyobservatory.com.au

2. BECOME A SECRET AGENT

Make identikit photos, match fingerprints and learn forensic testing at the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO) Discovery Centre, New Illawarra Rd, Lucas Heights. October 1-3, 9am, 11am and 2pm, \$10 (including an adult). More: ansto.gov.au

3. KIDS IN THE KITCHEN

Bring history to life at Elizabeth Farm and Vaucluse House, where kids can discover homegrown produce, bake damper, make butter, and prepare lemonade in the colonial kitchens. September 22-October 3, 11am, \$20 (including an adult). More: sydneylivingmuseums.com.au

4. UNCOVER CONVICT CLUES

With its prison cells, shipyards and convict workshops, there's plenty to see on Cockatoo Island. Children can follow the Convict Clues Challenge to discover the answer to a secret convict question. Entry is free and ferries depart daily. More: cockatooisland.gov.au

5. HIT A BULLSEYE

Channel The Hunger Games or Brave at Kids on Target at Sydney Olympic Park Archery Centre. The one-hour lessons for children aged 10+ are held every weekday and teach the basics of archery through fun and challenging games. Cost \$16.50. More: archerycentre.com.au

6. CLIMB THE HARBOUR BRIDGE

If scaling the bridge is out of your budget, get almost the same view – at a snip of the price – by climbing the 200 stairs to the Pylon Lookout. On the way, there are three levels of exhibits on the history and building of the bridge. Cost \$13/\$6.50. More: pylonlookout.com.au

7. ENJOY FESTIVAL FUN

Hear the Columbian tale of Senor Rabbit, enjoy dress ups and games at a special *Frozen* screening, or try origami or puppet-making at the Spot On Children's Festival at Riverside Theatres in Parramatta, September 30-October 4. More: riversideparramatta.com.au

8. HEAD UNDERGROUND

Explore underground tunnels and fortifications dating back to the 1870s while learning about

9. EXPLORE PARLIAMENT HOUSE

Kids can visit the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly chambers, have their photo taken in the Speaker's Chair and discover the democratic process at the free Parliament House Family Fun Open Day, September 26, 10am-3pm, Macquarie St, Sydney.

10. CATCH A MOVIE

Catching a movie doesn't have to cost a fortune. Tickets at Campbelltown's Dumaresq Street Cinema are only \$6, and Hornsby Odeon Cinema has \$8 2D movie tickets on Tuesdays. Still too much? Check out your local library or council for free or reduced-price screenings.

11. HAVE A PICNIC

Play a giant game of frisbee, take a walk on a slackline, join in the paper plane competition or get Mum and Dad involved in a family tug of war at Newtown Picnic Day, part of the annual Sydney Fringe Festival. Free entry. September 21, 10am-2pm. More: sydneyfringe.com

12. LIGHT UP THE NIGHT

Bring a torch and discover the native creatures that go bump in the night at a free spotlight walk at Harold Reid Reserve in Castle Cove. Don't forget to bring your own torch and binoculars. September 24, 7pm. Bookings essential: Contact Di Eva on 9777 7755.

13. GET CRAFTY

There's more than just books at your local library, with a variety of free or low-cost activities. Try jewellery making at Ingleburn's Greg Percival Library, sci-fi mask making at Campbelltown Arts Centre or chocolate making at Marrickville, just to name a few. See your council website for what's happening near you.

14. VISIT CONEY ISLAND

There's no entry fee to Luna Park, but rides are \$10, so make the most of it at the gorgeously old-fashioned Coney Island. A Coney Island Pass (\$10) gives all-day access, so kids can try the giant slide, mirror maze and Barrels of Fun.

15. SKIP THE QUEUES AT Q STATION
