


A quick-strike offense and an improving defense have the St. Louis Rams in the thick of the hunt for an NFC West title this year.

St.LouisRams

MARC BULGER QUARTERBACK

College: West Virginia Age: 30 Height: 6-3 Weight: 212 With his pinpoint accuracy and exceptional touch on the deep ball, Bulger is the perfect fit for the Rams' high-octane offense. The two-time Pro Bowler is never reluctant to put the ball in the air, but he does so strategically, spreading the ball among the many weapons in St. Louis' arsenal. Last year, Bulger started all 16 games for the first time and had his best season to date, posting a 92.9 passer rating and throwing for a career-high 4,301 yards (third-highest in the NFL), 24 touchdowns and only eight interceptions. Along the way, he set franchise records for attempts (588), and lowest percentage of passes intercepted (1.4). For his career, Bulger has passed for more than 300 yards in 23 games, and entering this season he owned a 36-24 record in the games he started.





WILL WITHERSPOON LINEBACKER

College: Georgia Age: 27 Height: 6-1 Weight: 240 In Witherspoon, the Rams believe they have added a player who will help them address the deficiencies in their run defense. Originally a third-round selection by the Carolina Panthers in the 2002 draft, Witherspoon signed with St. Louis prior to last year and in his first season as a Ram led the team in tackles with 136. That high level of production was nothing out of the ordinary for Witherspoon, who prior to last season led the Panthers in tackles for two consecutive years. A sideline-to-sideline breed of linebacker. Witherspoon possesses excellent speed and the versatility to play both the middle and weakside spots. In Defensive Coordinator Jim Haslett's scheme, the six-year veteran mans the middle linebacker position.



STEVEN JACKSON RUNNING BACK

College: Oregon State Age: 24 Height: 6-2 Weight: 231 A year after recording his first 1,000-yard season, Jackson was nothing short of amazing in 2006. He accounted for a league-leading 2,334 yards from scrimmage, the fifth-best total in league history. Given his size and athletic ability, it's not terribly surprising that the former first-round selection found success on the ground, running for 1,528 yards and 13 touchdowns and leading all running backs with 14 conversions on third-and-one. What was considerably more eyeopening was Jackson's contribution to the passing game, as he recorded 90 receptions for 806 yards and three more scores. Those 90 catches were the sixth most ever in one season by an NFL running back, and they established Jackson as one the league's true dual threats.



College: Vanderbilt Age: 31 Height: 6-1 Weight: 208 In his first year with St. Louis, Chavous solidified the safety position with his active play and, perhaps more importantly, the leadership and savvy decision-making that comes from playing nine years in the league. A former Pro Bowl selection, Chavous is a veteran defensive back who's not afraid to mix it up, as evidenced by the career-high 118 tackles he posted last year. That number was good for second on the team, behind Witherspoon. Selected by Arizona in the second round of the 1998 NFL Draft, Chavous has recorded 20 career interceptions.

A SERIES OF SHOOTOUTS

The Bucs-Rams series has been characterized by highscoring games, a trend that even predates St. Louis' offensive surge since 1999. The Bucs' 38-35 Monday Night Football victory in 2000 (see page 51 for more details) is the highest scoring contest in the two teams' shared history, but others have come close, such as the Rams' 34-33 squeaker in 1984 and a 31 27 contest that went the Rams' way in 1992. In fact, the averaged combined point total in the 15 previous regular-season Bucs-Rams games is 45.5, far higher than most of Tampa Bay's head-to-head series. Only the Bucs-Colts (48.8 points per game) and Bucs-Raiders (46.3) matchups have produced higher-scoring games on average.
