
Cincinnati had several major disasters in the past years when it comes to fire, a lot of neighborhoods have been damaged. Clifton, even though, has resulted to be one of the least effected, and in this article I will tell you why.

Created in 1853, Cincinnati Fire Department has 26 fire stations. These station houses have 26 motor organizations, 12 stepping stool organizations, 2 substantial salvages, and 12 doctor units. Furthermore, Cincinnati Fire Department has one HAZMAT, one channel salvage, one air terminal accident truck, two fireboats, and five salvage boats. These units are entrusted with covering 25 miles of coastline on the Ohio River, alongside 80 square miles of land. Cincinnati Fire Department reacts to a normal of around 48,800 calls every year and has 624 workers with a yearly financial plan of \$95,680,440, based on 2018 and 2019.

Considering the records, the city of Cincinnati is capable to face any catastrophe when it comes to the Fire Department service. "A firehouse is the cornerstone of a neighborhood," Washington, Cincinnati's Fire Chief said.

(2019, January 8). 2018 NFIRS Cincinnati Fire Department Incident Data: Open Data: Socrata." and a lot of research, I extracted the Queen city's most common incidents, the most recurrent time of the year when it comes to specific occurrences, what neighborhoods are implicated the most and what kind of incident was reported.




Cincinnati's nightmare when it comes to fire and emergencies calls is "Fire in Buildings". During the 2019 year, the Department got on average 2,000 calls for every season comparable to Fire - Building. With regards to the season, Fall is the most serious one, as a result of weather change and the utilization of warmers, (in light of records). The second more normal call from Queen city's populace is the Smoke Care or the scent of Smoke. Mark Sanders, Fire Assistant Chief of fire prevention said, "Our budget is currently 134 million dollars, but it is not divided equally, so it is hard to work with a budget based on donations when it comes to preventing disasters in Clifton."

The concerns of having a fire settle on individuals' houses, make people call the Fire Department 1,000 to multiple times for each season all things considered. Winter is by far, the season where these events occur the most. The occurrences are truly comparable consistently, being Fire - Building the most well-known reason for the fire in the city of Cincinnati. Based on the days of the week, early of itself, is when the catastrophes tend to happen. Jase Headings, a current neighbor at Clifton said, "We are always worried to have another fire disaster in our house, even though every time we had a problem, the department was here quick to avoid major damages."

With regards to the significance of fire episodes, the office arranges them - among different terms-for significance, zero being the most un-significant and four, the most. The

95% of the episodes detailed by the Firefighters during the year 2019, turned out to be a zero on the scale, being thus, not serious tasks.

In light of the data separated, the absolute number of occurrences in the Cincinnati region during the years 2015-2019 is 55,680 related to fire emergencies. Diminishing the number to the year 2019, the number gets decreased to 11,653. Westwood is the neighborhood with the most occurrences, 882 during that year, trailed by Downtown with 850 and Avondale with 744. Clifton, in explicit, isn't even in the main 10.



Dissembling Clifton, the neighborhood had a total of 984 calls related to emergencies. Extracting only the ones related to fire emergencies were a total of 216, being the automatic fire alarm the most recurrent action with a total of 66 calls during 2019. Clifton has been to be a good place to live when it comes to Fire Emergencies. The occurrences are less repetitive around this neighborhood due to the maintenance of the buildings, the number of occupants contrasted with land space, and the size of the area.

We have to go back to Dec. 4, 2019, for the occurrence of a big fire worth 1,000,000 dollars in damages in the neighborhood. Matthew Wood, a photojournalist who worked for FOX19 and currently working for WCPO9, let FOX19 know about the incident through his

Twitter account. Wood said, "Cincinnati fire crews are on scene battling a large, three-alarm blaze at Halstead and Addison streets Monday morning".

"The reality is when people call 911 for the fire department, no matter what it's for, it's usually one of the worst days of their life," said Matt Alter to Cincinnati.com, president of the Cincinnati fire union. "We need somebody in charge that remembers that and the work the men and women do."
