TUSD Board Meeting: Did the Mental Health of Students Influence the Decision to not Return to School? by: Amara Hackney

As you may know, the Tracy Unified School Board previously made the decision to hybrid model starting November 2, 2020. It was a long process worried because there are stugetting there, and along the way several topics were brought up on the pros and cons of the hybrid model option. While most topics revolved around the state of the county in the case of COVID-19 numbers and their falling projectory, the topic that caught a lot of attention was the fate of students' mental health if we considered staying in the distance learning model. The topic of mental health was first brought up by the member, Lori Souza, who spent

over ten minutes stressing the importance of bringing students back to campus, even if it is only send students back to school in a for two days out of the week. The teachers and staff members are dents that have not been turning on their cameras. The reason Lori Souza says this is a cause for concern is that with teachers unable to see students through the camera, they are also unable to get an idea as to if the student is even okay or if there is a cause for mandated reporting. With that being said, CPS cases have dropped by 28% compared to October of 2019 and that isn't the normal. Usually these cases would be higher, and Lori Souza feels the reason the cases have dropped is



because teachers are unable to notice the signs they would need to see in order to report to CPS.

The coronavirus is getting worse and worse every day. Coronavirus is a disease that started in 2019 (COVID-19). It was first identified in Wuhan, China. Scientists say it originated in bats. Coronavirus disease, abbreviated as COVID-19, "CO" stands for corona, "VI" for virus, and "D" for disease. Continuing the conversation of students' mental well-being was board member Jill Costa. She confronted the issue of the higher stress levels that are involved for both students and parents. In addition to this, many students have been forced into the situation of raising their younger siblings, while also trying to make it through their own classes, since they are the oldest person in the household for most of the day. She also brought up the lunch system according to the

proposed hybrid model at the time of the board meeting. School lunches provide the only meals some students get in an entire day. Under the proposed model, students would have lost their access to the school's lunch program.

Dealing with stresses of mental health, childcare responsibilites, and loss of lunch, without the support of a trusted adult, who understands the struggles they are going through and can help, will cause students to get lost in the gaps of the system.

While it is true the effects of the virus are a major concern, Lori Souza summed it up best when she explained that she understands her opinion on the matter may be an unpopular one. However, everyone must remember that psychology is a science and so when people tell her to follow the science, she replies with, "I am."

What is the Importance of the Black Lives Matter Movement?

The tragedy that took place in Sanford, Florida on February 26, 2012 was a horrifying event where a 17-year-old African American boy by the name Trayvon Martin was shot and killed by a 28-year-old man named George Zimmerman. This death caused an outcry across the nation but sadly, it is an outcry that has been felt by the black community for hundreds of years. All the way back to the beginning, when Black men, women, and children, were being taken from their homes, put on ships

and sailed to a land where they were made to be slaves.

Crepe Recipe by: Kyrrahlyn Dowell

Here is a tasty recipe that barely involves a mess and it is really easy to make. Make sure to have fun with it. Ingredients:

- · 4 eggs lightly beaten
- $\cdot\,1$ and 1/3 cup milk
- · 1 cup plain flour
- \cdot 2 tablespoons caster sugar
- · ½ teaspoon salt
- * 2 Tablespoons melted butter.

- 1. In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, milk, melted butter, flour, sugar, and salt until smooth.
- 2. Heat a medium-sized frying pan or crepe pan over medium heat. Grease pan with a small amount of butter or oil applied with a brush or kitchen paper so it does not stick. Using a serving spoon or small ladle, spoon about 3 tablespoons of crepe batter into the hot pan, tilting the pan so that the bottom surface is evenly coated. Do this very carefully. Cook over medium

heat, and be delicate with it. Cook 1-2 minutes on each side. When you flip it, be very careful because it can easily break and ruin the crepe. You can also make a savory crepe by adding eggs, onions, cheese, meat, vegetables tomatoes, avocado, spinach or whatever you like. When you're done putting what you want on it, you gently roll it up like a burrito but be more careful. Once you're done rolling it up and adding your toppings, you're done.

School Return Update

With the Covid-19 cases slowly decreasing in the San Joaquin County, the Tracy Unified School District Board of Education has decided that grades Pre-K-6 will resume classes in person starting March 22nd. The students in the pre-det-mined grades will be going back to class in an A/B hybrid model, while 7-12 graders will be going back once the county has moved

into the red tier. The school board projects that the county could be safe for students to go back soon, as the school board has voted for grades 7-12 to return to school two weeks and five days after the county is placed in the red tier.

That would mean the earliest grades 7-12 could return is March 23rd.
