


Cyber Crimes in the 21st Century: Cyberbullying




What If Your Child is Being Cyberbullied?

- 3) As discussed above, many tweens and teens are shocked to


discover that their cyberbullying behavior can have criminal consequences.

It is important to help your child increase the strength of existing friendships You may also want to set up an appointment for your child to speak with the school's counselor or an outside counselor to help them cope during this difficult time.



Cyberbullying Laws in New Jersey

Cyber harassment is a relatively new criminal act in the State of New Jersey, and one could potentially be charged with a third or fourthdegree felony offense. Those charges could end up with one facing up to 18 months in prison, a fine of up to \$10,000 and, in some cases, both. More serious instances of cyber bullying can be charged as stalking.Cyber harassment could also be a third-degree crime in some situations. For instance, if the person carrying out the cyber bullying was 21-years-old or older, but pretended to be a minor just so they could harass someone, consequences are much heavier. Those charged could face a fine of up to \$15,000 as well as three to five years in prison. In 2011, New Jersey enacted the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act, which, among other things, defines bullying, requires school faculty and staff to be trained in bullying and suicide prevention and sets forth procedures for reporting, documenting, and handling instances of bullying on public school campuses. Cyber bullying brings up unique concerns because it allows harassment to occur on a 24/7 basis, is permanent as is anything posted to the internet, and can go undetected because it happens outside of the school walls.
