Warm climate has scrambled my egg-layers

POULTRY enthusiast believes climate change has caused his birds to lay their eggs early.

Peter Corfield, who has kept birds for 25 years, says mother nature has tricked his geese, peacocks and ducks.

He is amazed that his ducks, which do not usually lay eggs until after March, have already given him eight ducklings.

His geese, which not expected to lay until February, started laying at the start of last

And he has two breeding pairs of peacocks, who usually lay twice a year in March and August, and they have already given him five baby peacocks and five eggs, which he is hoping will hatch for Christmas.

Peter, 68, from Worsley, believes they have been tricked into laying early because of the unseasonably warm weather we experienced recently

He said: "I believe the

eggs early is due to climate change. Our summers are reason they have laid their up and down and we are

in December but it has been mild.

"It is warmer than it

should be for this time of year and they will think it is time to lay their eggs.

"Our seasons are mixed up and it is confusing nature. They will think it is spring now instead of

"We keep hearing about climate change and I think it is disturbing them.

"I have kept poultry as a hobby for 25 years and the only time this has happened before is two years ago with the geese, who laid non-stop through the winter.

"It is usually the other way around - tȟey lay from February onwards."

Peter, a retired woodlands manager for Botany Bay Wood in Worsley, feeds his poultry twice a day with special feed and

corn throughout the day. He added: "If it isn't down to climate change it's because they are happy. I haven't changed anything with their routine.

"It's very nice to have baby peacocks and baby ducks at this time of year, but also strange.

Wildlife columnist Sean Wood said: "Warmer temperatures than normal will trigger some wild birds to
