And so we set up Cerebral Palsy United FC in 2014. Putting our players at the forefront, they decided what worked best for them.

Some our players, trustees and coaches have lived experience of cerebral palsy, too-whether they have it themselves or care for someone forefront who does.

We've since expanded to include

players of all ages, too, making the game accessible for all. From coaching to funding,

fundraising and the day to day running of the club, I love getting stuck in with the team.

But my biggest highlight was when we finally became a charity in 2017. With hard work and

funding, we've opened six CP

specific football centres in the North West.

It's not me who does all the workour volunteers are truly exceptional!

Watching as one of our players takes to the pitch without a walking frame for the first time makes my heart swell with so much pride. And seeing everyone cheer

each other on and bond on the pitch, I'm reminded of how much of a

difference our club is making. We really have formed a

family here,' one player said. Hearing those words, our mission to make football more inclusive felt worthwhile.

However, there's no way we're stopping there!

My next goal is getting more people on board.

Without our volunteers, all of this wouldn't be possible we're dead lucky to have them.
