now four-who were also born with moderate deafnesswere facing adoption due to troubling times in the family.

Speaking to my sister Carol, 42, we just couldn't let that happen. And so I decided to put



myself forward and kickstart the special guardianship process for Lillie, while Carol took in her siblings.

During every

appointment with the social worker. I was buzzing to meet Lillie, even though it was through a screen due to Covid.

Despite Lillie being too young to listen to me, I played nursery rhymes through my Alexa and sang to her on Zoom.

By the time I met her, I'd prepared everything-from car seats to clothes and toys.

I wanted to give her the life

she deserved.

Only, we faced an extra challenge, too - Lillie's moderate deafness.

As soon as she was old enough, we started learning sign language together.

And there was certainly no stopping Lillie.

Now three, getting stuck into her ballet, swimming and gymnastics classes, she's always on the go.

She's a right daredevil, too, going on all the rides at Drayton Manor.

'How do you fit it all in?' my friends always ask me. Being a full-time hospice nurse and a single parent to

Lillie can often be a challenge. But Carol has been a huge support for me, babysitting when I've had to work.

Together with Daisy and Oscar, too, we form one big, happy household.

On 23 April this year, I ran the London Marathon for Sense again.

With Lillie cheering me on from the sidelines, crossing the finish line was so rewarding.

I even managed to raise a whopping £1,850 in total.

Lillie has changed my life forever and I'm so grateful for everything she's taught me.

Getting to be her parent has been the ride of a lifetime so far.
