Community youth benefit from Annual Campaign's success

The Annual Campaign supporting Boys & Girls Clubs of the Sioux Empire (BGCSE) again is delivering on its promise to families, raising \$397,484 toward programs for children from infants to age 18. Thanks to campaign leaders and donors, area youth have access to safe, engaging activities six days a week.

"The concept and the word 'Club' are very important. It's a place where kids belong," said volunteer Campaign Chair Bill L. Baker. He was especially touched by a donor whose unexpected gift in the last stage helped put BGCSE within reach of its goal. "So many people feel a debt of gratitude to the separate Boys and Girls Clubs that existed here," he said. "My hope and belief is that the community will step forward and continue to support the Club."

The message is spreading: 180 new donors gave to the campaign, with strong support from the returning corporate base as well. Individuals and families accounted for 26% of all pledges, including nearly

\$19,000 committed by BGCSE staff members through the agency's first-ever employee campaign.

The campaign supports BGCSE agency-wide, including its Youth Enrichment Services programs. But the campaign's success is critical to operations at the Eastside Boys & Girls Club. While it costs a member just \$25 a year to belong, it costs BGCSE closer to \$1,200 to provide that student's programming, meals and activities.

For some youth, the Eastside Club has played an even bigger role. Earlier this year, Club staff learned that one family had lost a young sibling. Staff reached out, listening when members wanted to talk about their feelings. Staff drew in part upon grief-counseling resources developed by Boys & Girls Clubs of America. But it's personal relationships and trust built over time that enable the Eastside Club to become a true source of strength for families when they need it most.









BNSF Railway gives local youth the ride of a lifetime on restored train cars

Ever wonder what's inside a train car? Ask one of the 350 children, parents and friends of Boys & Girls Clubs of the Sioux Empire who boarded the BNSF Railway Special for a three-hour ride in early June. Sioux Falls was one of just nine cities visited this year, and the only community whose Boys & Girls Club got its own trip.

The train left a lasting impression with youth, and a \$10,000 unrestricted gift from the BNSF Foundation assures that the company's impact will be felt long after the final whistle bid farewell to Sioux Falls.

"It takes a lot of organizations working to help build and support a community," said Amy McBeth, Director of Public Affairs for BNSF Railway Company. "The Foundation places a priority on youth development and preparing youth for the future. Certainly, Boys & Girls Clubs fit perfectly. It's a pleasure to recognize groups that understand what their communities need, and to provide funding to help them do what they do best."

Guests of the Club and Youth Enrichment Services programs departed from the BNSF Downtown Depot and rode in style: inside one of 15 restored vintage railcars from the 1950s-1960s, powered by two of BNSF's newest locomotives.



Youth and family members from YES and the Eastside Boys & Girls Club boarded passenger cars on June 10 for a ride on the BNSF Railway Special. Volunteer leaders, donors and other friends of BGCSE lunched aboard the train during a three-hour round trip.

The Railway Special was designed to honor employees and their families for their contributions to the company's success. Since 1997, the program has grown to partner with regional youth-serving groups, traveling nearly 7,000 miles each summer along 32,000 route miles of track in 28 states and two Canadian provinces.

SMART Girls gets boost from Woman's Alliance

A local group that's served women and girls for more than a century has chosen the Eastside Boys & Girls Club's SMART Girls program to receive a 2012 ALENE DELBRIDGE AWARD. The Sioux Falls Woman's Alliance makes annual, competitive grants to initiatives that uplift socially disadvantaged women and/or girls.

The Alliance's \$5,000 gift will enable the Eastside Boys & Girls Club to enhance opportunities for and teach healthy behaviors to girls ages 8-17. Developed and nationally tested

by Boys & Girls Clubs of America, SMART Girls involves Club staff, peer leaders and community volunteers to help girls and young women address issues such as cliques and societal pressures, body changes, self-esteem and relationships – all in a safe environment. Sessions take place in a mentor-led, small-group atmosphere.

A case of "identity confusion": Everyone has it at some point in their lives!



In 2010, the YES Board of Directors voted to become a chartered member of Boys & Girls Clubs of America – Boys & Girls Clubs of the Sioux Empire. Rather than create a new entity, the Board chose to rename Youth Enrichment Services, Inc. Therefore, the organization's corporate/legal entity is Boys & Girls Clubs of the Sioux Empire.

This came in conjunction with opening the first of what we hope will be several Club locations in the area. Located in our Eastside Learning Center, our Eastside Boys & Girls Club is a Boys & Girls Clubs of America site in every sense it implies: drop-in center, low annual membership, and high-quality programming that Boys & Girls Clubs of America has become known for – serving youth ages 6-18.

And therein lies the problem. Boys & Girls Clubs serve older kids, while YES childcare serves children 4 weeks to age 12, and a lot of them!

Because BGCSE does not fit the template, until we have educated the public on this organization and all it

New YES site expands learning programs within city

Through its Youth Enrichment Services (YES) brand, Boys & Girls Clubs of the Sioux Empire is making it easier for families in northwest Sioux Falls to access quality childcare and education programs: The Kiwanis Avenue Learning Center opens this summer in the former Sertoma Bingo building, at 506 N. Kiwanis Ave. To reach new families, YES partnered with The Point Is To Serve, a fiveyear-old church group that owns and remodeled the property.

"We're looking not only for a longterm partnership, but a relationship," Pastor Allen Kjesbo said. His group knew an on-site learning center would help fulfill its mission in the community. "We did our research and we were really impressed with YES. It would take us at least 10 years to do what YES can do on day one."

The new site includes space for about 100 youth, infants through age 12. The facility features controlledaccess entry, outdoor and indoor play

spaces, and large classrooms to share with the church's youth ministry on Sundays, when YES is closed.

"We believe we can help transform our community and support families by providing them with a healthy environment," Kjesbo said.
