

The state of Florida has closed primaries.

Closed primaries require voters to register a party affiliation to participate in that party's primary elections.



There are two types of primary races Florida voters can participate in if they do not have a party affiliation.

Type 1:

Races in which all candidates in the primary have the same party affiliation and the winner goes up against no opposition in the general election.



Type 2:

Races for nonpartisan offices, such as:





Special districts

Local referendums

As of Jan. 2021, there are

3,810,837

active registered voters in Florida who have no formal party affiliation.

That's approximately 26% of all registered voters in the state.

Florida Amendment 3,
which proposed a
top-two open primaries
system for state offices.

Amendment 3 was
