The Basics

History Lesson



It's certainly hard to picture "Keep Waterloo Weird" on a bumper sticker, but before the city of Waterloo was renamed Austin after the "Father of Texas" Stephen F. Austin in 1839, that could have been the case. Since then, Austin has kept on changing. Once a haven for hippies and slackers, the capital city has transformed into a list-topping hot spot for young professionals previously more likely to favor cities like New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco. They come in droves, drawn by the favorable job market and relatively good cost of living. Sure, the traffic has increased, and mom-and-pop shops are giving way to luxury hotels and condominiums, but Austin also has more opportunity than ever. Businesses previously relegated to metropolis-type cities (hello, Facebook and Apple!) are making their way down South, mixing in with the kitsch as best they can. Let's put it this way: You can still get great chicken-fried steak at Threadgill's and head to Saxon Pub to see Bob Schneider play—it'll just take you longer to get there.

Local Landmarks

Four of the spots that make Austin so special



Barton Springs
With a water temperature of about 68 degrees all year long, this public, spring-fed pool and its surrounding grassy area are full of sunbathing and scantily clad Austinites.



The Texas Capitol
The red granite Italian Renaissance revival structure that sits on 11th and Congress is the center for all things political in Texas, including Wendy Davis' famous pink-shoed filibuster.




Mount Bonnell
Whether you're looking for the perfect photo op or a place to unwind, this spectacular view of both the city skyline and Lake Austin is well worth the climb, about 780 feet above sea level.



Lady Bird Lake
Named after Lady Bird Johnson, this lake serves as a focal point of the city. It's famous for its running trail, frequented by fitness-conscious citizens and visiting celebs.

Local Lexicon

In this city, there are some streets and towns that we just pronounce our own way



Buda

This nearby town is pronounced BYU-da.

Burnet

This hip road is called Burn-IT.

Guadalupe

Forget that "ay" sound you want to add on the end. This street is pronounced GWA-da-LOOP.

Koenig

Also called 2222, this lane is pronounced KAY-nig

Manchaca

This road is actually called Man-SHACK.

Manor

Both a road and a nearby town, this is pronounced MAY-ner.

No Car? No Problem!

You've got four public transportation options (though we need more)



Car2Go

Car2Go's model is simple: Get into one of its smart cars with a member card, drive it wherever you want and park it for another driver-in-need—or go back to it later to continue your journey.



MetroRail

It might not be as efficient as rail systems in other cities, but if you live north and work downtown this train can be quite convenient. The route spans 32 miles and has nine stops from Leander to downtown.



Buses

With dozens of routes and varied schedules, Austin's MetroBus Service makes commuting a bit easier. And with larger and more frequent MetroRapid buses equipped with free WiFi, you can save time stuck in traffic and check your email.



Austin B-cycle

If you're looking to burn some calories on the way to your destination, jump on the bike-sharing bandwagon and swing by one of the 40 B-cycle bike stations around town and enjoy the first 30 minutes free. Or, for a more permanent ride, sign up for an \$80 yearlong membership.

Take the Good with the Bad

Hey, no one is perfect—not even our fair city. These are the three most common complaints about it.



Allergies

Even if you weren't sneezing on a daily basis before you moved here, you might consider keeping a box of Kleenex by your side at all times. We sniffle and sneeze during the three pollen seasons (spring, fall, winter), and most of us are watery-eyed messes December to February thanks to the dreaded cedar fever.



Heat

If you can't stand the heat, get over it—because it's not going anywhere. With temperatures hovering around 100 three to four months straight and lingering heat that lasts well into October, the only solutions we can offer are an ice-cold beer, a dip in Barton Springs and the air-conditioned respite of an Alamo Drafthouse.



Traffic

Get used to spending a lot of time in your car. A trip down I-35 guarantees gridlock, so commuters are eagerly waiting word on the "cut and cap" proposal, which aims to create better crosstown flow. MoPac (Loop 1) commuters can sympathize; new construction to create express toll lanes on it has slowed things down considerably.

For most Austinites, chips, salsa and a margarita at the neighborhood Tex-Mex joint is still heaven.

If cocktails are more your taste, you're in luck, as the city has plenty of great bars to keep you entertained. A few to put on your must-try list: **Midnight Cowboy, Drink.Well., Peche, East Side Show Room, The Tigress Pub, The Gatsby** and **Whisler's**. But, again, we're just scratching the surface.

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Music Matters

With dozens of shows each night, festivals including Austin City Limits, South by Southwest and Fun Fun Fun Fest and world-class venues like ACL Live at The Moody Theater drawing top talent, it's clear that the Live Music Capital of the World is still deserving of its title.

And the homegrown talent has always been Austin's calling card; talented and decorated musicians, including Willie Nelson, Janis Joplin and Stevie Ray Vaughan, are inextricably linked to this city. Now, names including Gary Clark Jr., Shakey Graves and Max Frost are becoming part of that tradition. Aside from a plethora of music venues and a chill atmosphere, there are a handful of nonprofits making sure that local musicians are well taken care of, including Black Fret and Health Alliance for Austin Musicians.

Listen Up

Some of the city's most famous concert venues



Open since 1975, **Antone's** was the first club on Sixth Street. While it has moved several times—and is currently awaiting a new downtown location—there is no denying that this blues club helped popularize everyone from Stevie Ray Vaughan and Los Lonely Boys to Gary Clark Jr.



Known as "the best honky-tonk in Texas," **Broken Spoke** has featured country artists from Bob Wills and The Texas Playboys in 1964 to Dale Watson today. Now flanked on both sides by a mixed-use complex, the venue is Austin's prime example of the old-versus-new dynamic.



The Backyard, an open-air venue located about 20 minutes from downtown in Bee Cave, has featured big-name acts, from David Bowie and Foster the People to Willie Nelson, who has hosted several Fourth of July picnics there. Our inaugural jazz Fest was also held there last month.



Threadgill's started it all. Its owner, Kenneth Threadgill, was the first person in Austin to get a liquor license in 1933—the same year he opened the original location on North Lamar. Janis Joplin got her start singing there, and now there's a second restaurant location on Barton Springs Road.



A SoCo staple since 1957, **The Continental Club** was a main part of an amazing era of Austin music in the 1970s, featuring musicians including Vaughan, Charlie Sexton and Joe Ely. The venue is still considered one of the city's finest and hosts a variety of acts, from country to rockabilly.



After being relocated here from Lubbock in 1986, **Stubb's Bar-B-Q** quickly became one of the city's best indoor-outdoor concert venues [complete with barbecue]. It's hosted everyone from Adele and Snoop Dogg to Lady Gaga at her now-infamous SXSW show this year.

The New Crew

Young venues already making their mark on ATX

Indie bands from Austin and around the world flock to **Mohawk**, which has been open since 2006. The unique bar and live music venue has a small indoor stage and a two-tiered outdoor space for bigger acts, such as The Lemonheads, who played there in 2012.

Since 2011, **ACL Live at The Moody Theater** has been hosting about 100 concerts a year—on top of being the host of PBS' ACL TV tapings. It's hosted bands ranging from Tom Jones and Sheryl Crow to Robin Thicke.

Open since spring 2013, open-air venue **Austin360 Amphitheater** at Circuit of The Americas not only holds 14,000 people, but it has already hosted huge acts from Mumford & Sons to Jimmy Buffett.

Calling the Shots

Familiarize yourself with these famous directors



Terrence Malick

With films that include *Badlands*, *Days of Heaven*, *The Thin Red Line* and *The Tree of Life*, no other Austin-based director has had a greater influence on upcoming filmmakers than the industry's most-famous recluse.



Richard Linklater

His idiosyncratic style leaves some viewers dazed and confused, but most would agree that the diversity of Linklater's body of work [*Slacker*, *Dazed and Confused*, *School of Rock*, the *Before Sunset* trilogy, *Bernie* and the upcoming *Boyhood*] makes other filmmakers green with envy.



Robert Rodriguez

Famous for making his first feature, *El Mariachi*, on a budget of \$7,000, Rodriguez has gone on to create the *Spy Kids* movies and to be a frequent collaborator with Quentin Tarantino [*From Dusk Till Dawn*, *Grindhouse*]. Oh, he also started cable network El Rey last year.



Jeff Nichols

The city's next auteur has actually never made a film in Austin. But with three critically acclaimed ones under his belt, *Shotgun Stories*, *Take Shelter* and *Mud*, we don't mind. His next project, *Midnight Special*, stars Kirsten Dunst and his go-to actor, Michael Shannon.



David Gordon Green

The sometimes indie [*Prince Avalanche*, *Joe*], sometimes big-budget [*Pineapple Express*] filmmaker shoots in and around Austin constantly. Look for his newest production, *Manglehorn*, starring Al Pacino and Holly Hunter, later this year.



Kat Candler

Up-and-comer Candler made a splash at this year's Sundance with her Aaron Paul-led drama *Hellion*, which is being released in New York and Los Angeles this month.



Jay and Mark Duplass

Best known for indie films *The Puffy Chair*, *Cyrus* and *Jeff, Who Lives at Home*, these brothers have made seven films together since graduating from UT. These days, Mark is making a name for himself as an actor, appearing in *The League*, *The Mindy Project* and more.

Five movies that put Austin on the film industry map



The Texas Chainsaw Massacre

The slasher flick that started the gore-fest genre turns 40 this year. Future Oscar winners Renee Zellweger and Matthew McConaughey starred in the 1994 reboot of the franchise.

The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas

Yep, the 1982 romp starring Burt Reynolds as a sheriff and Dolly Parton as a madam was shot in and around Austin.

Blood Simple

In 1984, this stylish thriller launched the careers of its star, Frances McDormand, and the Coen brothers, who directed it.

Slacker

Richard Linklater's depiction of young Austinites gave the city its reputation of being a quirky, laid-back college town.

Office Space

Corporate spoofing doesn't get much better than the 1999 Mike Judge gem, which is now a cult favorite.

Lights, Camera, Austin!

With three major film festivals in town (Austin Film Festival, South by Southwest and Fantastic Fest), top-notch directors using Austin as their muse and movie stars casually gallivanting down SoCo, the mother ship for cinephiles is right here. (Sorry, Hollywood.) Recently, Richard Linklater's Austin homage *Dazed and Confused* celebrated its 20th anniversary, Jeff Nichols assisted in the McConaissance with indie hit *Mud* and Terrence Malick shot an as-of-yet-untitled movie that brought the likes of Ryan Gosling, Natalie Portman and Michael Fassbender to town in 2012. The benefit of filming movie and television productions here is more than just the considerable tax break—it's also hanging around with heavy hitters in the entertainment industry, including Linklater, who also heads the nonprofit Austin Film Society, director Robert Rodriguez and Tim League, owner and CEO of the Alamo Drafthouse franchise, who spread the gospel of Austin far and wide and encourage major players to invest in resident talent.

Fan-Tastic

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The city that proudly bleeds burnt-orange better make some room because Austin's sporting landscape is a lot more colorful these days.

Though we're a city without a major sports franchise, the 2012 opening of Circuit of The Americas catapulted us into the international stratosphere, and the 2014 X Games taking place this month is another major addition. The local minor league teams are doing well for themselves, too: the Austin Toros basketball team won the NBA development league championship in 2012, the Austin Aztex soccer team won its PDL championship in 2013 and the Round Rock Express baseball team has won five minor league titles. And, oh yeah, about those Longhorns: The dissolution of Mack Brown's tenure as the football program's head coach marked the end of an era. But new coach Charlie Strong brings a fresh perspective to a team in need of a little rejuvenation.

Longhorns

The burnt-orange faithful treat Longhorn football as a professional sport, if not a veritable religion. Recently hired head coach Charlie Strong brings new hope to the team, which has struggled in the past four years but went to the national championship in the '09 season and won it in '05. But it's not all football all the time; the university also has other exciting athletics, including basketball, baseball, volleyball, golf, swimming and diving and track and field.

Formula 1

Since November 2012, Austin has satiated our need for speed by hosting the Formula 1 United States Grand Prix at Circuit of The Americas. In only two years, the 3.4-mile COTA track has been called one of the best tracks on the F1 circuit, and the influx of international fans has brought worldwide acclaim to the capital city—as well as quite the financial boost.

X Games

Locals were thrilled last year when our fair city secured the bid to host the X Games, which happens this year June 5-8. The four-day festival takes place downtown and at COTA and features extreme sport competitions such as skateboarding, BMX and Moto X in addition to concerts and parties aplenty. Other Sports

Looking to have a ball? Head north to the Dell Diamond to see the **Round Rock Express** minor league baseball team, or get your kicks at an **Austin Aztex** soccer game at House Park stadium near downtown. This summer, you also can cheer on the new **Austin Aces**, a Mylan World TeamTennis team, and come fall, support the **Austin Toros**, a basketball team that plays in the NBA development league.

Biking/Running

A sunny day calls for a bike ride, run or stroll along the beautiful Lady Bird Lake hike-and-bike trail. Another great spot for running or hiking is the scenic Barton Creek Greenbelt. Bikers of all levels will enjoy the Veloway, a paved trail, while experienced bikers should venture to Emma Long Metropolitan Park, which contains fun but challenging trails that are steep and rocky.




