Art. Activism & Advocacy initiates a conversation about art's changing role in our contemporary world. More and more, artists are using their artistic practice as a form of activism, turning their artwork into prominent statements of advocacy for themselves, their local communities and broader global populations. Cleveland artists Amber Ford, Sarah Kabot, and student photographers from the youth program Shooting Without Bullets are all turning their lens toward some of the biggest social issues facing our communities and our nation: race, immigration and the ways in which consumers receive and process news media. Bringing these works together at Cleveland Clinic allows us the opportunity to reflect inward, and to encourage an open dialogue about issues that are directly affecting patients, visitors and caregivers-both within and outside our walls.



Amber Ford received her BFA in photography from the Cleveland Institute of Art in 2016. Her work has been shown in numerous Cleveland venues, including SPACES, The Morgan Conservatory, Zygote Press, Waterloo Arts, and Heights Arts. She was selected as a Creative Fusion Local Artist (2016) and has received an Ohio Arts Council Individual Excellence Award (2017).

Sarah Kabot is currently the Associate Professor and Chair in the Drawing Department at the Cleveland Institute of Art. She earned her MFA from the Cranbrook Academy of Art, and has has shown her work regionally and nationally and at such institutions as the Museum of Contemporary Art, Cleveland, OH; the Drawing Center, NY; and SPACES, Cleveland, OH. She has received numerous awards, most recently a Cleveland Arts Prize for Mid-Career Artist (2017) and a Creative Workforce Fellowship (2016).

Shooting Without Bullets is a Cleveland-grown artist collective and youth program that provides a platform for local students to explore their artistic interests. Self-described as "a for-impact organization utilizing an art as activism model to amplify the artistic voices of black and brown youth," the program has garnered increasing public attention since its inception in 2016.
