

KSPCB clarifies on plastic units

Separate question paper may lead to confusion: teachers

SSLC valuation likely to be complicated, time-consuming: schools

BENGALURU: The decision of the Karnataka Secondary **Education Examination** Board (KSEEB) to provide the question paper and answer booklet separately in this year's SSLC exam has caused anxiety among high school teachers.

"In a hurry, the students may write the wrong question number against their answers or the booklet used to be just right.

forget to write numbers for Now they may write long ansub-questions. They may stand to lose marks for such errors,' said the headmaster of a private school in Bengaluru.

While the system of providing the question paper separately did exist earlier, he said providing a combined booklet was better for Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE). "In the CCE system, students are required to write specific answers. The space provided in swers, unnecessarily," he added.

This may result in students losing precious time, said Shashi Kumar D, general secretary of Associated Managements of Private Unaided English Medium School in Karnataka (KAMS). "There should have been a consultation with teachers and headmasters before the decision was taken. A committee should have been formed to see whether the change had

merit," Kumar said.

While announcing the move, KSEEB said students will benefit because they would be able to carry the question paper back with them for reference.

Teachers are also worried that it will make the evaluation process complicated and timeconsuming. "The student can attempt questions in any order which means the evaluator will have to repeatedly look through the sheets for the matching answer. This may be

time-consuming," said a science teacher from Koppal taluk. Earlier, students could write only one answer for one question in the space provided. With the booklet, students are likely to attempt the same guestion more than once, making the task of evaluation difficult, he said. A senior official from the Board dismissed the concerns, saying it was a minor change and students will not face problems.

Guest lecturers say they didn't get pay for eight months

BENGALURU: The Karnataka State Government First Grade Colleges Guest Lecturers' Association will have a meeting next week, following which a decision will be taken on their further course of action to get their grievances redressed.

The association has been repeatedly approaching the government with their issues, but to no avail.

B Rajashekaramurthy, president of the association, said over the last eight months, none of the guest lecturers has got salary and that they had to resort to other part time jobs to make ends meet.

"Most of us have families. We are not able to depend on this income. Some of us take private tutorials and some others serve as security guards," he added. Rajashekaramurthy said the problem persisted for several years now.

"We have submitted several memorandums to the government. We have gone on strike. Yet the government seems to be deaf to our concerns.

Rajashekaramurthy said in all, there were 451 govt first grade colleges where 14,650 guest lecturers were employed. Of these, 6,000 were women. He said they had received no

"For the past 10 years, the government is paying guest lecturers only between Rs 10,000 and Rs 12,000 a month. Even this is not paid regularly. We get our pay only once in six months," Rajashekaramurthy said. The association has demanded that their pay be increased to Rs 25,000.

Job security is yet another concern for many. "Most of us have served for over a decade. Why does the government have to make fresh recruitments? It can give us permanent jobs instead," he said, adding that they had better ex-

The association will hold a state-level meeting on January 18, following which they will take a decision on approaching the chief minister.

Now 'Tiki Tar' sheet roads at HBR Layout

BENGALURU: The Bruhat Bencrete are poured on them. The galuru Mahanagara Palike is re-laying roads with 'Tiki Tar' sheets at HBR Layout at a cost of Rs 1.14 crore. The Palike had, for the first time, successfully laid these sheets on the Richmond Circle flyover recently.

The Palike decided to opt for the tar sheet asphalting technology in a bid to make the road surface more durable and weather-proof.

Under the new technology, asphalting work is carried out by laying 'Tiki Tar' sheets that are water-bound bituminous emulsions. These sheets come in rolls, packed in drums. These brown sheets become black six hours after they are laid. Once the colour changes, a primer and bitumen consheets are manufactured by Mumbai-based Tiki Tar In-BBMP executive engineer,

Traffic Engineering Cell (TEC) C S Umashankar said that a present, around 570 metres of the stretch from BDA Complex, HBR Layout 2nd Block to the corner of Tannery Road will be laid with tar sheets. "We have already covered a few metres of the stretch," he said.

Protest held demanding a safe city for women

BENGALURU: Proving that feminism is not only for women, Sangam Iyer, a media person, led a peaceful protest in Freedom Park against molestation of women on the night of December 31.

Around a hundred men and women from different backgrounds, dressed in black. gathered in the evening to demand a safer city for women.

"After I read about the incidents on New Year's eve, I could not sleep in peace. I wanted to do something about it,' Iver said. To take discussions beyond likes and shares on Facebook, he created an event titled 'Peaceful Protest against Mass Molestation'. The group raised slogans such as 'It's a dress, not a yes' and 'See it, hear it, report it'. Many women described personal experiences of being harassed.

Sanjiv Agarwal, said, 'The 'Chuku Buku Railu Beku' awareness campaign demanding commuter rail service for the city last year saw the participation of thousands of Bengaluru residents.

Man run over at Majestic bus stand

BENGALURU: In a hit-and-run case, a 25-year-old engineer was run over by a bus near the entrance of Terminal 3 of Kempe gowda bus stand on Saturday.

The deceased is Srinivas Rao, a native of Hindupur, who was living in CV Raman Nagar. He was working as a contract engineer for a Central government establishment, said the police.

Around 6.50 am, Rao was waiting to board an Andhra Pradesh State Road Transport Corporation (APSRTC) bus to go to Hindupur. As the bus arrived, passengers rushed towards the bus. Rao, who was also trying to board the bus through the front door, lost balance and fell down. The driver moved the vehicle and Rao fell under the front wheel of the bus and was run over, added the police.

The passengers raised an alarm and the driver stopped the bus. The public informed a traffic police constable, who alerted the Upparpet traffic police and shifted Rao to a nearby hospital, where he was declared brought dead. The driver of the bus fled with the vehicle. AP-SRTC officials in Hindupur were informed and have asked the driver to surrender.



Woman held for killing two-year-old boy

woman was arrested by Ashok Nagar police for causing the death of a two-year-old boy.

The arrested is Kasturi Bai alias Gita, a resident of Neelasandra. The incident occurred on January 9 at Bai's house in MG Gardens, Neelasandra, where a screen printing business is run.

According to the police, Arumugam and Sharada are construction labourers who had three sons. One of the sons, who worked as a screen printer in Bai's house, had brought along his two-year-old brother Vijay as there was nobody at home to take care of him. As Vijay was crying inconsolably, his brother told Bai that he would bring **DH News Service**

BENGALURU: A 42-year-old milk from his house nearby.

As soon as he left, Bai started bashing and kicking Vijay as he was crying loudly. The boy fell unconscious. When Vijay's brother returned, Bai told him that Vijay had fallen asleep and asked him to take the boy home. When Vijay's parents returned home, they discovered that he would not wake up. They rushed him to St Philomena's Hospital where he was declared brought dead.

The body was shifted for post-mortem which indicated that Vijay died of internal injuries. The police probe started with Vijay's brother who told the cops that Bai was at home when the incident occurred.
