Airport Metro route unclear, BMRCL looks to govt for help

BENGALURU: Commuters who are dreaming to zoom through the crowded central business district to reach Kempegowda International Airport (KIA) on Namma Metro will have to wait for several years.

In the absence of clarity on the route-map, the Bangalore Metro Rail Corporation Limited (BMRCL) has proposed to discuss 'all possible options with the state government in a few days'

BMRCL Managing Director Pradeep Singh Kharola told Deccan Herald that Rail India Technical and Economic Services (RITES) has submitted a feasibility study report to the BMRCL, which includes several route options of connecting

'Computers will do 90% of journalism in future'

BENGALURU. DHNS: Edward Kerr, Senior Editor-in-Charge at Reuters, believes that 90% of journalism in future will be done by computers.

Speaking at the inaugural class of the 2016-17 batch at the Indian Institute of Journalism and New Media here on Monday, he quoted the findings of a survey. The same survey though also revealed that people preferred stories with more insight and colour, which can be provided only by a human. Kerr talked about the effects of evolving technology in journalism and its practitioners. 'Technology is disrupting the profession but it is not destroying it." He stressed that journalists today had to be familiar with technology as it could help

them do a better job. Computers help them explore and report on a wider range of topics. Kerr emphasised that data would be the saviour of journalism. "Data journalism is the future in this data-driven world." According to him, ultimately, it is in the hands of the

journalist to take the challenge to rise out of the clutter. With the advent of social media, more information is accessible to the public. People are aware of the failures of journalism and are demanding unbiased news and in-depth analyses, he said. In spite of the sea change in all factors affecting journalism, its core values of fairness, accuracy and news judgement remain the same, Kerr said.

NICE project: SC gives eight weeks to Karnataka to resolve land dispute

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court on Monday gave further eight weeks time to the Karnataka government to resolve its dispute relating to acquisition of land to ensure completion of the multi-crore Bangalore-Mysore Infrastructure Corridor Project (BMICP).

A three-judge bench presided over by Justice J S Khehar allowed a plea made by senior advocate Dushyant Dave, appearing for the project proponent - Nandi Infrastructure Corridor Enterprise (NICE) and Advocate General Madhusudan Nayak for holding meetings.

On April 18, the court had directed senior advocate Arvind Datar, appearing for Karnataka and the Advocate General, to hold meetings with

plementing the apex court's 2006 judgment, which had upheld the High Court's decision dismissing different petitions challenging the land acquisitions. The BMICP involves construction of an expressway along with the infrastructure corridor between Bengaluru and Mysuru. The project, to come up on 20,193 acres, also envisaged development of five townships. The BMICP was to be built

by a private developer at an initial cost of over Rs $\overline{2}$,500 crore. It was expected to reduce the travel time between Bengaluru and Mysuru to just 90 minutes. However, the project envis-

aged in 2004, is yet to see the light of the day due to multiplicity of litigations in the Karnataka High Court and the Supreme Court challenging the land acquisition and rules allegedly violated by the state government to favour the company.

31 children take ill after drinking milk atschool

RAMANAGARAM: As many as 31 students of the MG Palya government primary school fell ill after consuming milk served to them as part of the Ksheera Bhagya scheme on Monday.

The students started vomiting soon after drinking the milk that was served to them at around 11 am.
