


As H.G Wells said, 'the air of Portugal has a natural happiness in it, and the people of the country should be as happy and prosperous as any people in the world'. It's a notion guests will appreciate as they arrive in Comporta. Little

more than an hour's drive from Lisbon, the town couldn't be further from the

bustle and noise of the capital city; here, sunshine drifts through the gently swaying pine trees, and the coastal breeze carries with it a tranquillity that defines the landscape. This is an oasis of calm, wellness and relaxation.

The coastal town of Comporta – dubbed *Portugal's best secret beach spot* by Condé Nast Traveller in 2022 – is situated within a region of expansive rice paddies, tumbling sand dunes and dappled canals where barefoot luxury meets a traditional way of living. Laid-back yet glamorous restaurants pepper a town awash with high-end shops and cultural attractions while stalls

a town awash with high-end shops and cultural attractions while stalls brimming with fresh fruits and vegetables line the streets and showcase Comporta's rich agricultural heritage. Comporta has welcomed visitors including Andy Warhol, Christian Louboutin and Madonna; it is no surprise the town is fast becoming known as 'the Hamptons of Europe'.



The town of Comporta brings to mind slow living and nature-inspired relaxation, practices encouraged at the retreat's Oryza Spa. The experience here is tailored to each guest and the spa facilities and treatments can be combined to create a fully customisable wellness journey. Guests can enjoy the spa's indoor and outdoor heated pools, gym facilities, hammam and sauna as well as private treatment rooms.

However, a true understanding of the local heritage is impossible without first sampling some of the region's finest flavours. Sal Restaurant Comporta is an internationally renowned eatery with all the character expected of a restaurant on the beach. Here, guests can admire the spectacular ocean views from beneath a shabby-chic woven canopy as they feast on traditional

Portuguese dishes. Freshly caught fish – such as sea bass and sea bream – attracts diners from all over the country and local produce including sweet potatoes and, of course, rice is the perfect pairing. Its popularity is such that a
