AWRINKLE IN TIME

(23RD MARCH)

Starring Oprah Winfrey, Reese Witherspoon and Mindy Kaling, A Wrinkle in Time has been tipped as the film that could change Hollywood. Based on an acclaimed 1962 novel, it promises to celebrate independence and goodness through its tale of a teenage girl travelling across dimensions to save her scientist father.

(16TH MAY)

SOLO: A STAR WARS STORY (25TH MAY)





ON CHESIL BEACH

INCREDIBLES 2

(13TH JULY)

It has been a whopping 14 years since The Incredibles was released: the brilliant, hilarious Pixar animation about a family of superheroes. After waiting literally over half our lives for this sequel, we have very high expectations for when it graces our screens in July.

CHAPPAQUIDDICK

(6TH APRIL, USA)

In July 1969 a car driven by U.S. Senator Ted Kennedy crashed in Massachusetts, killing his 28-year-old female passenger. Chappaquiddick tells the story of the incident, and Kennedy's actions in the aftermath. At the time of going to press there's no set UK release date, but it's expected in US cinemas in early April.

ANT-MAN AND THE WASP

(3RD AUGUST)

Superheroes come in all shapes and sizes, especially when they're Ant-Man (Paul Rudd) and The Wasp (Evangeline Lilly). It may not be the biggest superhero movie this year, but par for the course with Marvel, it sure looks fun – and having Lawrence Fishburne, Michelle Pfeifer and Michael Douglas doesn't hurt either.

UNTITLED CHRISTOPHER ROBIN PROJECT (17TH AUGUST)

There's no title confirmed for Disney's foray into the adult life of Winnie-the-Pooh's human friend, but what we do know is that Christopher Robin (Ewan McGregor) has lost his way somewhat after leaving the Hundred Acre Wood – and it's up to our bear hero to pull him out of his funk. Hayley Atwell also stars.

DISOBEDIENCE

(24TH AUGUST)

Based on the novel by Naomi Alderman and directed by Sebastián Leilo, Disobedience is a poignant and powerful arthouse film that explores the interplay of faith and sexuality. Rachel Weisz stars as Ronit Krushka, a woman who returns to her orthodox hometown community and reignites a passionate affair with her childhood friend, now the Rabbi's wife, played by Rachel McAdams.

THE CHILDREN ACT

(31ST AUGUST)

Starring Emma Thompson and Stanley Tucci, with a screenplay by Ian McEwan, we already know this is going to be a class act. High Court Judge Fiona finds her marriage to Jack disintegrating as she takes on a medical emancipation case - a young Jehovah's Witness with leukaemia.
