Szarawara was well-known for setting her friends up with romantic partners back home in Bogotá. She was match-making one of her friends when another friend told her she should try to find love herself. At the time, Szarawara was focused on raising her infant son, Julian, and not romance. Eventually, she decided to find love,



and made a profile on the dating site, Udate. That is where she met her husband, James, who lived in Pennsylvania. The two of them hit it off and began messaging each other.

"Our relationship was based on honesty. I was honest about my son and my way of life. He worked for a big university there as a librarian," Szarawara said. They decided to meet up in person, which prompted her to come to America. "I was not looking forward to leaving the country, but I found love."
