



#### EVER SINCE THE EARLY 20TH CENTURY, when

Tan Tock Seng Hospital (TTSH) moved to Novena in 1909, the area has been the main medical precinct for residents of the central region of Singapore. In more recent times, the area has seen the progressive establishment of various other medical care institutions — Ren Ci Hospital, the National Skin Centre (NSC), HCA Hospice Care, Dover Park Hospice and the National Neuroscience Institute — all of which have been located there ever since.

The latest addition to this major medical precinct is the Lee Kong Chian School of Medicine (LKCMedicine), with its inaugural batch of medical students having commenced their course on 5 August 2013.

Given the close proximity of these institutions to one another, they have often worked together to provide comprehensive healthcare to the public. For example, the wards of Ren Ci Hospital — a community hospital and rehabilitation centre — also accommodate TTSH patients who have been deemed stable and need less clinical care. Such an arrangement frees up beds at TTSH and allows the acute care hospital to help more critical patients.

It was during discussions in 2010 on the upgrading of TTSH, the National Healthcare Group's (NHG's) flagship institution, that the idea to expand and physically link the medical service providers in the precinct was put forth. Thus, Health City Novena was born.

More than just building a bigger hospital or having more state-of-the-art facilities, the Health City Novena master plan envisions a 17-hectare modern integrated healthcare hub, to be completed by 2030, that will serve the future healthcare needs of a rapidly-ageing population in the central Singapore area. In fact, the current proportion of people in that area aged 65 and above is 15 per cent, compared to the national figure of 10 per cent.

Beyond healthcare, Health City Novena encompasses a complete ecosystem. In line with its vision of becoming a precinct where *Healthy* Life is Central, it will offer facilities for health services, research and education as well as commercial, leisure and communal spaces.

The master plan was launched on 30 August by TTSH, NHG, stakeholders, grassroots leaders and the Ministry of Health. Between now and 2030, when Health City Novena is set to be completed, eight new developments will be progressively added, with key expansions in the areas of healthcare, education and research.

It is estimated that by then, some 600,000sq m of floor space will be made available for healing, learning and research — a 150 per cent increase over current availability. Aside from the addition of an estimated 30 per cent more beds, resources will be channelled to intermediate care, including rehabilitation, subacute and palliative care.

# STATE-OF-THE-**ART FACILITIES**

THE EIGHT NEW DEVELOPMENTS OF HEALTH CITY NOVENA.

### PROPOSED INTEGRATED INTERMEDIATE CARE HUB

This multi-purpose facility will cater to the intermediate care continuum with services for sub-acute care, rehabilitative care, palliative care and therapy. Dover Park Hospice and a proposed second community hospital will be housed here. This hub will be connected to TTSH and Ren Ci Hospital for seamless and coordinated patient care and transfers. The centre will also house specialist clinics catering to immediate care.

### THE FOUR Cs

There are 4 key components of the Health City Novena master plan: Care, Continuous Learning, Community and Connectivity.

**CARE** will be characterised by the eight new buildings that will help to raise the level of specialist expertise in Singapore. The buildings are: an integrated intermediate care hub where Dover Park Hospice and a second community hospital will be located; a new national centre; an expanded TTSH ambulatory centre; a national centre for infectious diseases: a medical education and training building; LKCMedicine's Clinical Sciences Building; a future health sciences school; and an extended NSC and NHG headquarters (see artist's impression).

The plan is taking into consideration how the new buildings will be linked to current ones, to ensure that complementary functions can be aligned and provided holistically and conveniently to patients.

Besides LKCMedicine, Singapore's third medical school, plans are also in the works for two more buildings for learning — TTSH's medical education and training building, and a proposed future health sciences school. These institutions will create an environment for **CONTINUOUS LEARNING AND INNOVATION** in the Health City. The aim is to create facilities that will synergise with one another and enable healthcare professionals to upgrade their skills. At the same time, they can learn to work in multi-disciplinary teams to address increasingly complex healthcare needs. Under the supervision of worldclass experts, they will also gain hands-on experience in hospitals, patients' homes and other settings where healthcare is delivered. To integrate with the **COMMUNITY**, the Health City environment is being designed

with the public in mind. Welcoming architecture, green spaces, parks, plazas, and exercise trails will make it conducive for communal activity. And for easy access to Novena MRT Station, a sheltered boulevard with stalls and shops on either side will cut through the precinct.

A park built around a conservation building will be used for events and family activities. Residents and members of Grassroots organisations will be invited to air their thoughts and expectations during the development of the community arenas.

Bringing these facilities and amenities together is **CONNECTIVITY**. When Health City Novena is completed, about 30,000 people are expected to visit TTSH each day, double the current figure. To ensure that human and vehicular traffic flow is smooth and safe, all buildings will be linked at three levels: above ground, at street level and via the basement.

Healthcare buildings will be connected via sky bridges to give inpatients privacy and facilitate direct movement. The siting of specialist clinics nearer to Novena MRT Station means easier access for outpatients coming for consultations.

All routes will be sheltered and residents need not worry about taking the long way around Health City Novena to reach the MRT station as an underground walkway from Akyab Road has been planned. To keep surrounding roads pedestrianfriendly, drivers will be encouraged to enter the interconnected basement car parks immediately upon arrival. About 4,000 parking lots are expected to be available.

### **CLINICAL PROFESSOR LOW CHENG HOCK**

I started working here in 1983. I remember how we used to have some pavilion wards, and our rounds used to start from there and continue all the way up to the main building. It was quite a long distance and every morning was a good exercise — those were great times. And in those early days, what impressed me most was the *kampung* spirit of this hospital.
