Telenursing tools make it possible to receive blood pressure measurements, blood sugar readings, and other data from patients, reducing the number of inhome visits necessary to monitor their health. Telenurses serve more patients each day, as they completely eliminate travel time from their schedules.

### **Required Competencies**

In addition to clinical competency and assessment skills, telenurses also need a number of specific skills and abilities related to technology. The ability to connect to the Internet and use basic productivity tools is essential, as telenurses are expected to document their efforts. Telenurses should also be able to use videoconferencing equipment, digital cameras, and other equipment used to enhance patient education. Strong communication skills are a must, as working with patients via telephone or Internet takes away the opportunity to use body language and other nonverbal cues to help determine a patient's needs.

#### **Career Preparation**

Those interested in a telenursing career should prepare themselves by taking additional courses in health informatics, health information management, or nursing technology. Many community

and technical colleges offer professional development courses in basic computer skills such as navigating a Windows computer environment, communicating via e-mail, and using popular software programs for word processing and database management. Learning a foreign language may also be helpful, as you may work with people from other countries.

# **Telenursing Risks**

Despite the many benefits of telenursing, it also has risks. There's always a possibility that equipment will fail, leaving patients without access to much-needed monitoring and support. Employers try to minimize this risk by performing frequent equipment maintenance and backing up patient data, but they can't guarantee that computers, telephones, and other equipment will never fail. The confidentiality of patient health records is also a concern. This increases the risk that others will access medical data or health insurance information. Telenurses may also need additional professional liability insurance if they work with clients in other states or countries.
