Captain Grant's House

Captain Grant's House in Preston, CT, was built in 1754. Once used to house Civil War troops and slaves who'd escaped, this Airbnb is still haunted today. You'll have a bedroom, bed and bath all to yourself, though ghosts may be nearby.

Set on five acres of property (hopefully you won't have to escape the sprawling grounds in the middle of the night), each private room in the house is fit for one or two guests. Swing by the billiard room, too – there's a pool table from the early 1900s.

Talliston House and Gardens

Set near London in Essex, England, the haunted bedroom at Talliston House and Gardens is decorated as it would have been for an Edwardian child. Not only does this Airbnb simply *look* like a place you'd assume is haunted, some believe it actually is.

The listing says there are “unexplained smells and sounds” and that the rental is “not for the faint hearted.” While you'll stay in the master bedroom, which is filled with books and toys, the rest of the Victorian house is open for guests to explore, too.

Malaga Inn

The boutique Malaga Inn in Mobile, AL, is the state's most haunted hotel. Built in 1962, the historic property has Victorian decor and an outdoor courtyard, but its biggest appeal is the numerous haunted experiences guests have had.

Sightings include a woman wearing white, chandeliers that swing for no reason, lights that turn on by themselves and furniture that inexplicably moves. Since the lady in white seems to prefer the balcony of room 7, that's the one to book if you want the best chance of having a haunted experience.
