## Number of Goalscorers in 2019-20 Premier League

Fabinho's magnificent strike against Manchester City made him the 13<sup>th</sup> different Liverpool player to score in the Premier League this season.

But that's not the only table Jurgen Klopp's current side sit high above the rest.

In this alternative table, Liverpool are the only side who could fill every outfield position of their starting line-up, bar the goalkeeper, with players who have scored this season.

This is displayed in the graphic below (number of individual Premier League goals in brackets).



Manchester City (11), Chelsea (10) and Leicester City (9) occupy the remainder of the top four, though Pep Guardiola's side are below both the Blues and the Foxes in the actual Premier League table.

Surprisingly, Newcastle are fifth and along with the Foxes also have nine different goalscorers in their side, six of them defenders, despite sitting in 13<sup>th</sup> in reality.

The two West Midlands sides, Wolves (9) and

Aston Villa (8) finish off the European spots while Brighton (8), Everton (8) and Sheffield United (8), complete the top 10.

In the battle between the two North London rivals Tottenham Hotspur (8) lie just above Arsenal (7) as the Gunners have dropped six places from their current league standing.

However, Manchester United, who recently moved into seventh place – their highest position in over two months – are worryingly 18<sup>th</sup> in this alternative table along with Crystal Palace, Norwich City and Southampton with only five different scorers in each squad.

With almost a third of the league season already behind us, the Reds' command a significant lead, and as research shows Liverpool's goalscoring presence is all over the field.

Could this prove to be a pivotal moment for Sunderland-born Jordan Henderson as he aims to become the first Liverpool captain since Alan Hansen to lift a league title in over 30 years?
