Craig regains club champion title

In the Handicap Championship, Marion Robinson finished second in both rounds to take the overall title with nett scores of 79 and 77 off her handicap of 23.

Dianne Wilkinson, who plays off 15, had the best nett score in the second round with 76.

Phil Ball amassed the excellent total of 40 points to be the comfortable winner when the seniors held their away day on the links at Redcar.

Known as Cleveland Golf Club, this is the only links in Yorkshire and has the redundant steelworks as its imposing backdrop.

In a stiff breeze, 27 players enjoyed the challenge of adapting to links golf and Ball won the lower handicap section by five points from Don Kidd, with Alan Coulthard in third place.

In the over 18 handicap section, Colin Stead won with 36 points, ahead of club captain Ross Law (35) and Phil Appleby (34).

With all the par threes being into the wind, competition for the nearest-the-pin prizes

proved less than fierce, with one going unclaimed. Phil Hartley, Phil Ball and Lawrie Swiers won the others.

Compare this to the build up for last year's campaign when they had a 100 per cent record heading into their Northern League Division One season.

Without sounding all doom and gloom, West's preparations got off to the perfect start when Nathan Fisher struck early on against his former club Richmond Town in a narrow 1-0 win.

However, that delight soon turned sour with no victories in their next three games.

Firstly, a star-studded performance from National League North side Spennymoor Town saw them hit West for six before further frustration followed against Division Two opposition in Tow Law Town and Crook Town.

Fisher strikes to earn an opening day point

NATHAN Fisher's spectacular second-half strike earned West a hard-fought point in their opening Northern League Division One match at home to Ryhope CW.

Adam Burnicle gave West the lead on 20 minutes before Gary Pearson's side hit back with goals either half from James Ellis and Micky Rae.

Gary Forrest made four changes from Tuesday's defeat at home to Marske United with Mark Bell, Danny Mitton, Ross Colquhoun and Amar Purewal coming in for Tom Flynn, Liam Hegarty, Joe Hillerby and David Dowson.

Nathan Fisher carved out the first chance 11 minutes in when he struck a right-footed piledriver from 35-yards out only to see James Winter tip it round his left post.

Nine minutes later, West found the breakthrough after good work by Fisher and Tom Price, the latter crossing from the left to the advancing Burnicle who flicked it in to grab the opening goal of the season. It could, and probably should, have been two a few moments later as Adam Mitchell's corner was met in the centre by an unmarked Amar Purewal.

Jon Weirs made a vital clearance to avert the forward's goal bound header.

Ryhope offered very little in the first half but found an equaliser with two minutes of normal time remaining when Micky Rae's shot was inadvertently parried by Mark Bell into the path of Ellis and last season's prolific goalscorer made no mistake to give Gary Pearson's side a shift in mo-

mentum.

On 53 minutes, Ryhope completed the turnaround when a well-worked short corner was delivered low by Ellis before being fired in by Rae to spark jubilant scenes in the visitors' technical area.

The last time these two sides met at the Wanted Stadium, it was a pulsating 2-2 draw back in December and it proved to be a case of déjà vu when Fisher's thunderous strike from just outside the area flew past Winter and nestled in the far corner to set up a tense finale.

With two minutes remaining, Ryhope almost scored a late winner after Ellis burst through following a teasing pass, however, Mark Bell came to West's rescue with a fabulous one-handed save to push his effort onto the woodwork as both sides had to settle for a hard-earned point.

West were due to make their first away trip of the season on Tuesday evening, travelling to Woodhorn Lane to
