




Purpose and Need

- Invest in community partners







Project purpose is to expedite recovery of forest landscape values in burned and partially burned areas, by:

- Reducing burned fuel loads
- Initiating conifer regeneration
- Improving forest resilience in unburned areas
- Restoring riparian and meadow ecosystems
- Enhancing recovery of special status species
- Repairing roads for watershed health & safe access
- Enhancing recreational values
- Improving damaged grazing infrastructure

Project Overview

- US Copper Corp
 - 13 sq miles of Claims
 - Investment Corporation
 - Application for Vested Mining Rights



What "Vested Mining Rights" Means

- Mine operator does NOT have to:
 - File permits through the county to:
 - For mining
 - For road construction
 - For building sites
 - Follow California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in planning phase
 - CEQA regulations are skipped in the planning phase

Note:

- SMARA Required Reclamation Plans are for AFTER the mining has occurred
- Reclamation plans have a history of failure
- Ensuring the safety of our water, air and land will require good PLANNING

Why the Vested Rights Hearing is Important

- Vested Rights are NOT a decisive factor for the creation of a mine
- Not requiring permits will:
 - cause the county to lose revenue
 - decrease local knowledge of the processes occurring
 - Reduce local oversight of a foreign company (That will export millions of tons of US copper to China)
- Allowing mine operators to bypass CEQA in the planning phase will:
 - Reduce the measures put in place to protect our community the natural world
- The vested rights hearing is currently ongoing







Broadband Update

- Plumas County Broadband Study
 - \$125,000 total cost, Plumas matched \$25,000
 - 26 other Counties in California participated
 - Meant to be a resource document
- Local Agency Technical Assistance (LATA)
 - Provides Funding that will result in low-level, construction ready network design for identified project areas
 - Done operations in Dec '23 were conducted under this program
- Federal Fund Account Last Mile
 - Golden State Connect Authority has applied, not awarded
 - If awarded, approx. 40 miles of open access, last mile, municipal fiber broadband network.
