




Typical stick frame wall assembly (~6"-8" thick)



What is mass timber?


- → Solid, engineered wood products
- → Cross Laminated Timber (CLT)
 - Panelized construction
 - Prefabricated components
 - Robust structural properties





Mass Timber/CLT

- → Monolithic wall construction
- → Chars on exterior when exposed to fire
- \rightarrow Built-in fail safe components
- → Fire resistant wall material in CBC Ch 7A
- → High thermal performance

Logging

After the KidMOB workshop, the double intern worked on presenting to the community in the form of a poster board exactly what the Mob did during the workshop and the significance of their work for Greenville.











SPREADSHEETS/DIGITAL FILING




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
