Plumas County Fiscal Year 25/26 Recommended Budget

- Budget Public Hearings occurred September 15 and 16, 2025
- September 30, 2025, Public Hearing to receive public comment and consider adoption of the FY25/26 recommended budget

- \$174.1 million recommended budget
 - General Fund \$60.8 million (35%)
 - Special Revenue Funds \$90.5 million (52%)
 - Debt Service Funds \$10.6 million

 - Internal Service Funds \$4.1 million
 - Enterprise Funds \$5.2 million
 - Special District Funds \$2.5 million

County Disaster Recovery Coordinator Full-Time 1.0 FTE Position

- Board of Supervisors approved position on March 18, 2025
- Limited term position, funded through Fiscal Year 27/28 (June 30, 2028)
- Funded from the County's PG&E Dixie Fire Settlement monies
- Started interviews in May 2025
- Interview panel includes Supervisor Kevin Goss, Planning Director Tracey Ferguson, Grant Manager Zachary Gately, OES Manager Lori Pini, and Plumas Rural Services Executive Director Paula Johnston
- Board of Supervisors held a closed session item on September 16, 2025, to discuss 'public employee appointment' of the Disaster Recovery Coordinator, with no reportable action

2021 Dixie Fire Recovery For-Profit Business Economic Development Grant



- Up to \$20,000 per grant (or \$22,700 'buying local')
- Must be in 'Grant Eligibility Zone' (generally areas of Greenville, Crescent Mills, Taylorsville, and down the Hwy. 70 Canyon)
- Total of 16 business have been awarded to-date, equaling: \$315,907.71
- Target is to fund a total of 25 businesses
- Funding remaining, through May 10, 2026:
 \$251,592.29 (roughly 12 more businesses working with 5 currently)

PLUMAS REALTORS ASSOCIATION FIRE INSURANCE GRANT PROGRAM


- Grants awarded to assist with 50% of first year fire insurance premiums up to \$5,000.
- Buyers of primary homes from May 2025 through April 2026.
- First-come, first-served basis.
- The properties must be located in Plumas or Sierra counties.
- Purchase price no greater than \$550,000.
- In order to qualify, buyers cannot have owned homes within the past three years, and they must be represented by a Realtor.

2024-2029 Plumas County General Plan Housing Element Update

- Public review July 28, 2025, through August 8, 2025.
- Received 51 comments from 11 individuals.
- Met with 11 County departments/housing stakeholder agencies.
- Comments concerned 1) the availability and 2) affordability of housing and the 3) diversity of homeownership options and 4) housing types, as well as the 5) need to provide housing opportunities to families in Plumas County.
- The draft Vision of the 2024-2029 Housing Element is, as follows: "Adequate supply of safe and livable housing types with opportunities for individual choices that accommodate all socioeconomic segments of the unincorporated County area, leading to housing possibilities that meet the needs, protect the environment, and are consistent with a jobs-housing balance based on future population and economic conditions."
- Now under a 90-day state review, with deadline of mid-November 2025.
- Community meeting anticipated for October 2025.



Greetings,

After two years of legislative and budget maneuvering, the governor this week signed a bill to waive state income taxes for survivors of wildfire disasters who were paid settlements for their losses by the entities responsible for starting the fires, primarily electric utilities.

The bill covers the tax years from Jan. 1, 2021, through Jan. 1, 2030, and covers settlements from any fire declared to be a state or federal disaster – including the Dixie Fire, the Mill Fire and the Slater Fire, which devastated communities around the 1st Senate District in recent years. (The years are when the settlement was paid, not when the fire occurred.)

This has been a long and complex effort in the Legislature, including the veto of a similar bill last year. But I have been committed to making sure that California doesn't balance its budget on the backs of wildfire victims, and that money paid out as compensation for losses goes toward helping families rebuild.

Getting this across the finish line was a team effort, and I'm grateful for the partnership of Assemblywoman Heather Hadwick, Assemblyman Tom Lackey, and the administration in ensuring this critical tax relief.

Similar tax relief was included in the state budget in June, but was limited to payments from class-action lawsuits. The updated language passed in Senate Bill 159, which the governor signed Wednesday, broadens the eligibility to cover all settlements.

For those who have already paid income taxes on past settlements, refunds should be available through the Franchise Tax Board by filing amended state tax returns. For guidance, it can be helpful to contact a tax professional.

DISASTER RECOVERY COORDINATOR

DEFINITION:

Under general direction, plans and oversees the County's local disaster recovery projects and programs; implements, coordinates, and advocates local disaster recovery goals, objectives, and outcomes; fosters cooperative working relationships among County departments and serves as a liaison to the community and federal, state, and local agencies; provides staff assistance to the County Administrative Officer or the Board of Supervisors in areas of disaster recovery; and performs related duties as assigned.

DISTINGUISHING CHARACTERISTICS:

This position is an at-will, limited term position through fiscal year 2026/27, based on available funding from the PG&E Dixie Fire settlement. The Disaster Recovery Coordinator is a single-position classification responsible for performing disaster recovery program management work. The Disaster Recovery Coordinator will serve as a subject matter expert and technical advisor in disaster and emergency management recovery projects. The position operates in a highly visible and evolving arena working on significant and strategic disaster recovery projects as well as coordination of County disaster recovery priorities and directives.



Provides 10 yards of road base rock to homeowners in Camp Fire footprint to create 5 ft of defensible space around their homes (Zone 0- the 1st 5ft next to the home)

- To better protect individual homes from wildfire
 - more participants = safer community
- Biggest hurdle for getting "Wildfire Prepared Home" certification in Zone 0

- Educational tool






What Happenend Next
