

PLUMAS COUNTY UPDATES Dixie Fire Recovery Business Economic Development Grant Program

- For-profit businesses
- Directly or indirectly impacted by the 2021 Dixie Fire
- Start-up businesses post-2021 Dixie Fire
- Physical business location (now or in the future) within the Grant Eligibility
 Zone
- Online only business that meets criteria to qualify within the Grant Eligibility
 Zone
- Provides neighborhood-serving retail or other goods and service-based businesses available to all residents in Plumas County
- Eligible grant activities include:
 - 1. Business Equipment and Supplies
 - Operating Capital Expenses (i.e., payroll, insurance, utilities, rent/ mortgage)
- Up to \$20,000 per grant (maximum \$22,700 with locally purchased eligible activities)


