## Albuquerque's Struggle to Address Homelessness and Housing Affordability

New Mexico prohibits control over rental rates, limiting availability of affordable housing options for low-income individuals.

Below, you will find a breakdown listicle of key points affecting Albuquerque's homelessness issues, housing crisis, and the dire need of support from legislation and the community. For an in-depth article, go to this link.

- The city of Albuquerque faces hurdles in fulfilling legislation for a more comprehensive project related to housing affordability. They have hit a brick wall.
- The MIT Living Wage Calculator indicates a minimum wage of \$16.10 an hour is required for a single person without dependents in Bernalillo County to earn a living wage.
- They prohibited political subdivisions and municipalities in New Mexico from enacting ordinances or resolutions that control or would have the effect of controlling rental rates for privately-owned property.
- New Mexico has the highest increase in homelessness as measured by the point-in-time (PIT) count at 27%.

- The housing market in Albuquerque has limited availability of affordable rental properties for lower-income individuals.
- Households with higher incomes often occupy rental units affordable to low-income individuals.
- New Mexico's homeless community is facing a funding crisis, as federal and state agencies fail to provide adequate support.
- Many homeless individuals do not qualify for the government-aided stipends received after filing taxes.
- The homeless population cannot sustain themselves through extreme weather conditions for several years while waiting for housing programs to provide them with basic necessities.
- Donations to smaller nonprofits are an essential lifeline for providing aid to the homeless population. Without this aid fulfilled, the community will not suffer greatly.
