

Cruising's New Ships on the Dock!

After facing unprecedented challenges due to the pandemic, the cruise industry has witnessed a remarkable resurgence in demand. This surge is largely fueled by eager travelers who have experienced cancellations or delays in their planned voyages, coupled with new customers who are optimistic about the safety and appeal of cruising in the post-pandemic era. This pent-up demand has manifested in a significant spike in bookings for the years 2022 and 2023, as evidenced by several notable instances in the industry.

The lifeblood and future success of any cruise line are intrinsically linked to the continual expansion and rejuvenation of its fleet. This growth predominantly comes through the addition of new builds, a process that several cruise lines engage in almost annually, taking delivery of one or two ships each year. These new vessels are the product of years of meticulous planning and design, allowing cruise lines to introduce state-of-the-art features and set new industry standards. These ships are here to offer more space, more luxury, and more unforgettable memories.

Here's a glimpse of what's on the horizon for cruise enthusiasts in 2024:

Icon of the Seas

The Icon of the Seas, a notable addition by Royal Caribbean International, marks a significant milestone as the first ship in the Icon class. This colossal vessel, weighing in at 250,800 gross tons, is set to become the world's largest cruise ship, surpassing its predecessor, the Wonder of the Seas, from the Oasis class. Its maiden voyage is scheduled for January 23, setting sail from Miami. Designed to accommodate a staggering 5,610 guests at double occupancy (and up to 7,500 in total), the Icon introduces state-of-the-art concepts to the cruising world. One such novelty is a vibrant, candy-colored neighborhood designed specifically for young families, alongside the Thrill Island neighborhood which boasts an array of attractions including six waterslides and an aerial obstacle course. The ship is dedicated to offering seven-day Eastern and Western Caribbean itineraries throughout the year, ensuring a varied and exciting cruising experience for its passengers.

Utopia of the Seas

Another impressive creation by Royal Caribbean, the Utopia of the Seas, is set to make its debut as the latest vessel in the Oasis class. Although it doesn't quite match the Icon in size, with a gross tonnage of 236,860, it boasts a slightly higher guest capacity at double occupancy, accommodating 5,668 passengers. The Utopia of the Seas offers unique features not seen on its sister ships, such as the Caribbean-inspired Pesky Parrot tiki bar and an extended version of the Ultimate Abyss slide, complete with state-of-the-art "zoom booster rollers" — a feature touted to be the longest dry slide at sea. In addition, the ship will offer a novel dining experience designed to emulate the ambiance of dining in a train car. Set to sail on its journey on July 22, the Utopia will focus on shorter cruises, operating out of Port Canaveral.

Sun Princess

Princess Cruises' Sun Princess, setting a new standard in their fleet, is the first ship of the Sphere class. With a gross tonnage of 175,500, it's the largest in the Princess Cruises lineup. The Sun Princess, accommodating 4,300 guests at double occupancy, differentiates itself with a brighter interior decor than its predecessors, complemented by a unique sphere atrium, a geodesic dome, and a three-deck activity zone. The ship is also set to introduce eight new dining options, including a love-themed specialty restaurant serving aphrodisiac-inspired cuisine. Its inaugural voyage is scheduled for February

8, with initial sailings across the Mediterranean and Europe, before heading to Port Everglades for the winter season of 2024–25.

Queen Anne

Cunard Line's Queen Anne marks a notable expansion in their fleet, being the first new ship in over a decade. With a gross tonnage of 113,000, the Queen Anne surpasses both the Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth in size, offering 14 passenger decks and a capacity of 2,996 guests at double occupancy. The ship embodies a blend of Cunard's 182-year heritage with contemporary design trends, featuring a retractable dome over the pool deck and more spacious, bright, and outdoor-friendly environments. The Queen Anne is set to embark on its maiden voyage on May 1, with a roundtrip scheduled from Southampton, England.

Silver Ray

Silversea Cruises is expanding its fleet with the introduction of Silver Ray, a sibling to the notable Silver Nova, which has captured attention since its debut. Boasting a larger size and unique, asymmetrical design, Silver Ray offers an unparalleled experience with its public areas and key amenities positioned towards the ship's sides, providing exceptional sea views. Notably, the ship's pool area deviates from traditional central placements, located instead on the starboard side, allowing guests to enjoy unobstructed sea vistas while swimming or lounging. Additionally, Silver Ray introduces two novel dining concepts: Marquee, an alfresco dining area offering sea views from the port side, featuring The Grill and Spaccanapoli pizza outlet, and The Dusk Bar, an open-air sky bar situated at the ship's rear. Set to service in June, Silver Ray will accommodate 728 guests, emphasizing more glass space for enhanced viewing, continuing Silversea's legacy of luxury and innovation at sea.

Explora II

MSC's luxury line, Explora Journeys, is adding the Explora II this year, closely following the design and offerings of the previously launched Explora I, with some alterations in retail options. The ship, featuring 461 oceanfront suites, nine culinary experiences, and a selection of pools including three outdoor and one indoor, will make its debut on August 11. Its initial journey will take passengers from Barcelona to Civitavecchia (Rome), followed by voyages in the Western Mediterranean before relocating to the Caribbean in November.

Ilma

The Ritz-Carlton Yacht Collection, a relative newcomer to the cruise industry, is set to launch its second ship, the Ilma. Nearly twice the size of its predecessor, the Evrima, the Ilma has a gross tonnage of 46,750 and is designed to accommodate 448 guests. Its inaugural sailings are planned for September, focusing on the North and Baltic Seas.

Disney Treasure

Disney Cruise Line's Disney Treasure, one of the last new ships to debut this year, is also among the most eagerly awaited. Disney Cruise Line is expanding its fleet with the introduction of Disney Treasure, marking the second new addition in two years, following a decade without new ships. Slated for release at the end of 2024, this ship follows closely on the heels of Disney Wish, launched in 2022, and shares many features and designs as part of the Triton Class.

Disney Treasure will introduce several unique attractions, including Plaza de Coco, a new Mexican restaurant inspired by the "Coco" movie, taking the place of the previous "Frozen"-themed restaurant. Additionally, the ship will feature a Haunted Mansion-themed bar, offering a fresh take on the lounge

experience by replacing the "Star Wars"-themed Hyperspace Lounge found on Disney Wish. New to Disney Treasure will be Jumbeaux's Sweets, an ice cream and candy shop drawing inspiration from "Zootopia," and Skipper Society, a bar echoing the Jungle Cruise ride's humor. This spot, replacing The Bayou on Disney Wish, will serve themed drinks and snacks like waffles. Periscope Pub, another novel venue, draws inspiration from Jules Verne's "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea," and serves as the ship's sports bar, succeeding Wish's Keg & Compass. Its design features submarine-like elements, including a giant periscope and porthole windows. A standout addition is a new Broadway-style musical, "Disney The Tale of Moana," bringing the story and music of Moana to the stage for the first time, alongside two returning shows from previous Disney ships. The top-deck will boast AquaMouse, a thrilling water ride, consistent with its predecessor.

As the cruise industry sails beyond the pandemic's tumultuous waters, it welcomes a wave of innovation and growth, marked by the arrival of new, majestic ships. These vessels, each a marvel of modern engineering and design, promise to elevate the cruising experience to new heights.
