#### **Library Ranking**

For perspective, we start with Library Journal's annual ranking of all U.S. libraries based on the level of service they provide their communities. It groups libraries into budget categories and measures them on a per capita basis in four key areas: circulation, visits, computer use, and program attendance. The publication awards 3-5 stars to the 30 top-ranking libraries in each budget category. Below is what we found.


Accountability is a hallmark of public service, and we've run the numbers to guide your budget discussions and planning. For every dollar you spend on your library:



By comparison, the average library in the US spends  $67\phi$  on staff,  $11.2\phi$  on books and  $21.8\phi$  on all other expenses.


### **Measure of Library Efficiency: Staffing**

#### **Measure of Library Efficiency: Visits**

Knowing your library's efficiency level puts you in a powerful position. It tells you exactly what you need to keep doing well and what areas need improvement—two important factors to know during budget discussions. Here we've calculated your efficiency by dividing the library budget by total number of visits to get a dollar cost per visit. We use the number of visits because they effectively represent all other areas of library activity, since users must generally visit the library to check out a book, use a computer or attend a program.

2 will go to a program (and 70% of those will be children)




Children account for 58% of programs and 69% of program attendance nationally

13 will come to use a computer





And the other 84 will come to get a book (and 42 of those will be children)





#### **Five-year Service Trends**


The following charts show the general health of your library and specific services that have been growing or declining. The five-year trends are based on data your library submits to the State Library and to the Institute of Museum and Library Services.













#### **Peer City/County Comparisons**
