





Ms. Frabotta and her friends decided to tailgate from New Castle and hoped to hear Elton John sing his famous "Candle in the Wind."

For Ms. Frabotta, this will be her first time attending an Elton John concert — and she expects to cry.

"I mean the queen died ... he's gonna do a tribute to Princess Diana, for sure," Ms. Frabotta said. "I just know I'm gonna cry."
