Purpose

Reframe has a heart for artists to not only demonstrate the beauty of Christ but to live out this beauty in their own lives.

Reframe provides a spiritual incubator for artists to grow in Christian spiritual and moral formation.

In his letter to artists the late Pope John Paul II writes:

"In shaping a masterpiece, the artist not only summons his work into being, but also in some way reveals his [or her] own personality by means of it."1

Put differently, all art is autobiographical. Thus we believe it is vital to help shape artists of moral and Christlike character. This will be achieved through cohorts, workshops, and a commitment to community and accountability.

Once artists have undergone a process of discipleship we will collaborate with them to

host a exhibition. We believe that physical demonstration and immersion in a space expands the human soul.

We believe that beauty demonstrated in its various forms can and does bring the gospel to life for people who are sceptical. For, "just as God created all of a beautiful world, we are sent to co-create and re-create a beautiful world."²

Reframe will provide a tangible, neutral location, in the heart of Fremantle for sceptics to experience beauty.


In sum, the heart of **Reframe** is to collaborate, cultivate, and empower local artists to share the gospel story through discipleship and demonstration.

Location

FREMANTLE WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Fremantle is located on the western coast of Australia. It is home to seekers, skeptics, and artists,

Fremantle is deeply intertwined with its history, culture, and natural surroundings. Fremantle is a hub of creativity and artistic expression.

Fremantle might be considered hard ground for the Gospel in light of the above observations, but we believe it is a vital place to see revival in our city in our time. We believe that it is vital to make our home amongst the seekers, sceptics, and artists if we are to reach them with the Gospel.³

PRINCESS THEATRE 2 LEAKE STREET, FREMANTLE

The Princess Theatre stands as a historical gem that has witnessed over a century of cultural and theatrical evolution.

Built in 1912, this Edwardian-style theatre holds a significant place in the city's cultural heritage. Today the Princess Theatre is used as a warehouse by a local family of upholsterers (Polimeno Family) but continues to fall into disrepair.




DETAILS

This property has a ground floor area of approximately 1170sqm comprising a massive 1045sqm of internal open space with cavernous high ceilings. There is office space, wet areas as well as a strong room including the original safe, a wide staircase leads upstairs to a further 285sqm of mezzanine, stepped seating, projector room and more office space and wet areas.

Beauty will save a city

"A thousand years ago Prince Vladimir the Great, the pagan monarch of Kiev, was looking for a new religion to unify the Russian people. Towards this end, Prince Vladimir sent out envoys to investigate the great faiths from neighbouring realms. When the delegations returned, they gave the Prince their reports. Some had discovered religions that were dour and austere. Others encountered faiths that were abstract and theoretical. But the envoys who had investigated Christianity in the Byzantine capital of Constantinople reported finding a faith characterised by such transcendent beauty that they "did not know if they were in heaven or on earth."

"Then we went to Constantinople and they led us to the place where they worship their God, and we knew not whether we were in heaven or earth, for on earth there is no such vision nor beauty, and we do not know how to describe it; we only know that God dwells among men. We cannot forget that beauty."

Upon receiving the report from the Constantinople delegation of the unearthly beauty they had witnessed, Prince Vladimir adopted Christianity as the new faith for the Russian people.

Is it possible that the Christian message can be communicated in terms of beauty? Along with apologetics and ethics, is there also an aesthetic that belongs to the gospel of Jesus Christ? Beauty is integral to the Christian message... to a generation suspicious of truth claims and unconvinced by moral assertion, beauty has a surprising allure.

And everything about Jesus is beautiful."4

Obstacles
